Live Stock Notes.

To the dairyman the summer protection of his cows is a matter of considerable importance. They require protection from the sun's rays when these are so warm as to produce discomfort; from flies during the fly season, and from rainstorms, which are often cold, prolonged and severe. Neglecting to furnish protection in any of these respects results usually in seriously lessening milk yields. Such protection is beneficial to all classes of domestic animals, but it is especially important in the case of cows because of the relatively high value of the milk product which they furnish. Cows are, of course, protected from the sun's rays when they are provided with shade. This may be in the form of trees growing in the pasture, or in a place easily accessible. Sometimes a cheap roof sustained by poles and covered with straw, placed in the pasture, or access to the yard or stable enables the cows to secure the necessary protection from the heat of the sun. These means answer very well until the fly season arrives. It is then that their chief defects are most apparent, as they furnish breeding places in which the flies multiply with great rapidity. The best shade is the ordinary stable. As a rule it is cool, while the flies might be in a great measure excluded. Basement stables are especially suitable for use in summer, because of their great relative coolness.

Absolute protection from flies during the hot season is not always practical. It may mean an excessive outlay for materials used in the spraying of the animals. Usually a mixture of fish oil and crude carbonic acid makes a cheap and effective protection against the annoyance of flies. Everything possible should certainly be done to promote the comfort of the cows during the fly season. One of the best methods is to keep them in the stables during the day. These should be thoroughly ventilated, and yet kept so dark that flies do not care to stay, much less to work in them. Another method is to cover the animals with blankets made of light, coarse, cheap material. They are kept in place by elastic bands, but are not altogether satisfactory, as the whole body is not covered.

Keeping the cows in the stable during the day throughout the summer season is a practice that has many commendable features. It furnishes more of coolness than the other forms of shade, gives the most perfect form of protection from flies, saves pasture and makes it practicable to supply the cows with succulent food in the form of soiling crops. The chief objection to it is the amount of labor involved both in feeding the animals and in keeping the stable clean. If the manure is promptly removed to the fields and the yards freely sprinkled with lime, will be possible to make this method a source of increasing satisfaction to the dairy farmer. The cows should have a good pasture in which to run at night, and should be provided with plenty of good drinking water at all times. Dairy cows that are yielding a large quantity of milk are not, as a rule, injured by a gentle summer rain, but are usually grateful for it. The case is different, however, when they are subjected to violent storms. In early spring and late autumn long and cold rains sometimes last two or three days at a time. Even occasionally mid-summer storms occur that do the cows harm. Prolonged exposure to one such storm may result in a material lessening of the milk flow, which it may be difficult to recover for many days afterward. There can be no question as to the wisdom of housing dairy cows at night as soon as the hours of darkness are cool enough to produce any discomfort.

Council Meeting.

The town council met Monday night, all members present.

The Town Treasurer's report for March showed tax collections amounting to a little over \$300, and a deficit at the Bank on March 31st amounting to \$2608.55. The mayor said it was high time the board made a move to collect the large amount due on last year's assessment. The council should wake up and assert itself.

Coun Hagerman reported that the Water Committee had decided that Dr Camber's bill for a new copper hotwater tank should not be paid.

Coun Thorne wanted to know if the new Supt of Water Works had signed a contract. Coun Hagerman replied that the contract had not yet been drawn up, but he would see that it is completed within a few days.

Coun Hagerman reported that the electric pump broke down on Saturday, one of the coils burning out. Water is now being pumped by the old steam outfit. Mayor Balmain said something should be done along the line of making a settlement with the McDougall Company. They should either make the present pump come up to specifications, or put one in that would. It was decided that the contractors be notified that in the event of their failure to make things satisfactory the town will bring an action for damages.

Bills and accounts were read. Several "legacies" from last year were received, one item being included in a bill from James Carr, for the use of a horse last summer.

Mr Carr also billed the town \$72 for 24 days work as Supt during March, after his resignation had been accepted. On motion Mr Carr will be asked to appear before the council Friday night to talk the matter over.

Geo E Phillips was granted permission to put a hydrant in the cellar of his new house, at his own expense.

Coun Thorne informed the council he as chairman of the License Committee had instructed the Chief of Police to enforce the dog tax. After June 1st all dogs without the tag will be destroyed.

The yearly motion in favor of a sidewalk for Richmond street was unanimously put through. It was decided to get in communication with a competent man with a view to securing a proper survey of the streets.

Coun Fawcett started a discussion on the beer question. He said the present license law is nothing but a farce. Two or three men paid the license, and the rest sold right on just the same. There was something wrong. He moved that the law be repealed. Coun Thorne said he agreed with Coun Fawcett that conditions were pretty bad. He thought there was very little sense in licensing beer shops anyway. It was either right or wrong to sell beer. If right, no license is necessary; if wrong, proceed under the Scott Act. In order to have the question threshed out he would second Coun Fawcett's motion, providing he would make it so that the proposed repeal would come into effect June 1st, thereby giving time to consider what course should be taken for the future. Coun Fawcett agreed to the proposition.

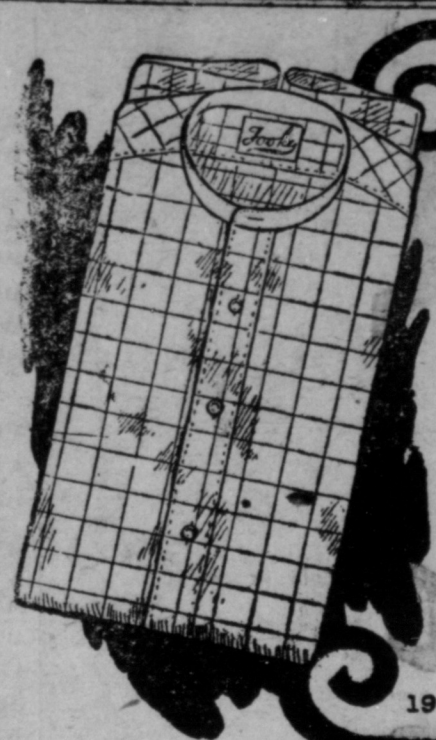
