

THE NEW ROAD ACT.

Some of the Interesting Details of the Act Which Will Replace the Highway Act.

The act which will take the place of the present Highway Act will, it is understood, provide for the appointment of a Board for each parish composed of the two county councillors for that parish and one member to be appointed by the Government. It will be the duty of this board to divide each parish into districts and to appoint a surveyor to take charge of each. The board will also have power to decide what amount of taxes will be assessed each year for the parish, the maximum rate being fixed by law.

The Board will have control of the monies raised by taxes and the monies appropriated each year by the Government for the parish roads and will make estimates at the commencement of each season of the expenditures which will be necessary in the districts of their parish.

All accounts before being paid will have to be submitted to and approved by the Auditor General.

The payment of taxes in cash or by statute labor will be optional.

It is understood also that the idea of appointing an official whose special duty it will be to inspect the roads throughout the province and to instruct the people regarding the proper methods of roadmaking is also receiving the attention of the Government.

The above article is from the Gleaner, and may be fairly accurate. One thing is certain,—the present "four-guttered Road Law" will be retained until Jan 1st, 1909. Hazen's new law will not come in force until that date. It will be seen that the new law, like its predecessor, has some good features and likewise a number which will not prove satisfactory. Mr Hazen promised to give the people full control, but he seems determined to saddle a man on each parish, whose chief duty will be to draw a salary. There is no need of this third parish commissioner. The two councillors are sufficient. The idea of appointing a provincial official to inspect the roads is merely one which will result in the fastening of some leech on the public treasury.

Carleton County Minerals and Bridges.

Yesterday Messrs B F Smith, M P, and Donald Munro, M P P, of Carleton county, were heard before the Provincial government on the necessity of the development of the mineral resources of the county. They received assurance that the government would do all in its power to assist. There are several mining properties in the county which they felt should be developed as gold, copper, coal and iron are thought to abound. None of these properties are far from Woodstock. The action of Messrs Smith and Munro in the matter is to be commended. Mr Smith also impressed upon the government the necessity of providing a new highway bridge at Florenceville, and also to provide a bridge across the St John river at some point in the parish of Kent, in the upper end of the county—(Gleaner, 10th April.)

Our local members are evidently making a bluff at doing something. The above article tells part of the tale, but the most interesting features are of course eliminated. It will be remembered that early this winter the Diamond Drill was brought for the first time to Carleton County, and as was then publicly announced it was the intention of the Robinson Government to leave the drill in the county for several months in order that the mineral assets thought to exist in this section might be fully investigated. The Britton mine, the Cobbler Sexton and some coal areas were to be looked after. Work was begun upon the Britton Mine, but had not proceeded far when the drill broke down. This necessitated a lengthy delay. Just about the time work was proceeding nicely the change of government took place, and the first thing we knew one day the man in charge of the drill received an order from the new Surveyor-General ordering the outfit shut down and boxed ready for shipment. There were parties in Charlotte County who wanted the drill, and as they had a pull with Hon Mr Grimmer of course the people in Carleton could go to in so far as the new rulers were concerned. Just then some parties up here got busy. Some very straight talk was handed out to Mr Munro by his supporters, and he was plainly told that it was up to him to get after the government. The Hon W P Jones had the drill brought to the county and all arrangements were made to have it left here so long as necessary and on the very best terms conceivable, but just the moment Mr Hazen's government took charge it was ordered that the drill be sent away from Carleton County, almost before it had more than got nicely to work. This is proof positive that the change of masters has resulted in hardships to those wishing to develop mineral resources in this section. Of course in order to plac-
