### Insurance Agent Fined.

D Hall Fairweather, Inspector for Wm Thomson & Sons, St John, was before Magistrate Dibblee Tuesday afternoon on complaint of the Town Marshall to answer the charge of violating one of the local by-laws, which provides that any person engaging in the occupation of insurance agent, not being a ratepayer, must take out a license under pain of a fine not exceeding \$20.

J O Hartley, town clerk, prosecuted. J N W Wislow appeared for the accused. Mr Hartley called Amos O Day, M E Gallagher and A E Jones. It came out during their evidence that Fairweather had approached each of them with reference to insurance, and that Jones had given him a plate glass risk and Gallagher a renewal of a fire risk.

For the defence R E Holyoke, Town Treasurer Bourne and the defendant gave evidence. Mr Fairweather said he was merely an Inspector, and had no direct personal interest in any business he might secure as the commissions invariably went to the credit of the local agent. Mr Bourne proved the payment of taxes by The Anglo-American Co in 1907. R E Holyoke deposed that he had been appointed local agent for Thomson concern on April 2nd.

After brief addresses by counsel the Magistrate in giving his decision expressed his belief that the by-law had clearly been violated, and therefore fined defendant \$5 and cost, or 10 days jail. The case may be carried to the Supreme Court.
