Provincial Elections.

It is semi-officially announced that the Assembly will at once be dissolved, and the elections called on, with polling March 3rd.

The Candidates.

As announced last issue the electors in the upper parishes will have the privilege of listening to the three Liberal candidates next week at Bath, Johnville, Summerfield, Centreville and Glassville. In addition to the standard bearers there will be other speakers at each meeting, arrangements to that end having been completed. At these gatherings it is to be hoped that as many as possible will attend for the purpose of hearing what the candidates and their friends will have to say in defence of the administration. It is well-known that the Opposition ticket have been industriously campaigning for months, making all sorts of charges against the government. A story is never complete until both sides have been heard, and we have full confidence in the ability of the government ticket to give a good account of itself on the platform, or in the halls of the legislature for that matter.

Hon Mr Jones five years ago won his way into the Assembly at a time when everything pointed in the direction of complete Opposition victory. The government forces were then dispirited and disorganized. A severe reverse in federal politics had but recently been sustained, and to add to the unfortunate condition of affairs there were internal differences, now happily a thing of the past. In spite of all these handicaps, the whole government ticket came within an ace of winning, it being freely admitted that had the contest come off on a fine day with good roads, Messrs Smith and Flemming would have been beaten. Since that memorable struggle the federal seat has been redeemed by a large majority, and the prestige of the Conservative party irreparably damaged. Mr Jones in addition is a member of the government, and finds himself the unanimous choice of a militant and dominant party. He has grown greatly in the esteem of the general public, and can confidently look forward to an undoubted and decisive victory.

His colleagues are both well known. Ex-Warden Harry Carvell

of Lakeville is one of the sturdy men of Carleton. His sound common sense, intimate knowledge of the needs of the people as attested by reason of having sat several years at the Council, and rugged honesty of purpose, eminently fit him for the dignified and responsible honor of representing the County of Carleton. Mr George W Upham, although new to political life, is no stranger to the men of this county. Throughout his whole career he has been a large employer of labor, and where he is best known he is most respected. Although making no claims to oratory, he is not incapable of taking care of himself on the platform. Essentially a man of deeds rather than words, in striking contrast to certain of his opponents, Mr Upham is just the kind of representative we need. All in all, we can safely say that the Liberals of this constituency have a ticket presenting in itself many strong claims worthy of consideration, and when to this is added the espousal of a good cause, success should crown their efforts.

Two Great Victories.

Wednesday was a red-letter day for the federal government. South Huron, carried in the general election of 1904 by B B Gunn, cons, with a majority of 111, and vacated by his death some weeks ago, swung into the liberal column, electing Murde Y McLean, editor of the Huron Express, by the splendid majority of 134 over a gentleman named Horton. The Liberals of Stanstead, Quebec, not to be outdone, on the same day elected a son of their late member, Mr Lovell, by a majority of 275, despite the fact that a dead set was made on the county by Mr Foster, Mr Ames, Mr Bergeron, and Rufus Pope, who all did their level best in favor of the Conservative candidate, A H Moore, a gentleman of great personal strength and much ability. These two victories, one of them the capture of a seat, must be a source of sincere satisfaction on the part of the administration. It has been industriously circulated in the East that Ontario is hopelessly conservative, but such events as the Huron contest give the lie to the assertion. Close judges of the situation, unbiased by partisan feeling, predict that Ontario is more apt in the next general election to go Liberal than otherwise, in which case Mr Borden's present following will be decreased rather than augmented. We all know how Quebec and the Maritime Provinces stand, and the great West is not likely to repossess its confidence in the party of protection. The scandal-mongers of the Conservative party, who have been trading on the products of the gutter, must change their tactics before the public will treat them seriously. The sooner the Opposition rids itself of such men as Foster, Fowler and others of their ilk, the sooner the party will gain in the esteem of the country. Sir Mackenzie Bowell, a former premier, has openly expressed his intense hatred of Foster and all that is Fosterian, but the party has so far been too weak in leadership or decision to cut loose from its chief hiatus.

W B Belyea, the only charter member of Carleton Lodge, I O O F, at present and continuously in good standing since Oct 11th 1881, was on Monday evening presented with the Veterans Gold Medal, at a function presided over by Coun H D Stevens. The committee in charge consisted of H V Dalling, P Saunders and the chairman. Speeches were given by the Chairman, Mr Belyea, Chas Comben, Ald Fisher, R Allingham, Hon W P Jones, A G Bailey, W W Hay, Miss Calder, Mrs Dalling, Mrs Baker and others, after which a banquet was given by the Rebekahs.

Mr Munro's Record.

Mr Munro has retired from the Mayoralty after occupying it for two years, and it might not be amiss to review briefly his record while in office.

He has been unable to prevent an up to date lighting and pumping plant from being installed by which the Town is saving some thousands of dollars.

He came into office with a debit balance of \$4,000, and during the two years he has been in office he has assessed for \$32,000 each year, being in the vicinity of \$4,000 more than was ever assessed before in the Town, although he made the statement when he assumed the office that the taxes were too high and must be lowered.

He leaves office with a debit balance of over \$2,000 which the succeeding Council must provide for, in addition to \$1,000 due to the School Trustees, and also leaves the largest delinquent list in the history of the Town at the close of the financial year.

When he assumed office there were three beer saloons in the Town, and he leaves it with about a dozen, some having paid the license, but more having not done so.

He found the Town fairly temperate, he leaves it about the most open Town in the Province of N B, the only requisite for getting all the ardent which anyone requires is the money with which to pay for it.

He deposed Mr Colpitts because he would enforce the Act, he appointed a successor because he would not enforce the Scott Act. He pays the Scott Act Inspector his full salary although he was absent nearly three months, and when Councillor Dunbar brought the matter up in the Council he shunted off the discussion on the ground there was not a full board present.

He refused to pay Mr Bagley, the driver of the Town team, for five days lost time, and also for the time he was sick with typhoid fever contracted in the unhealthy quarters which he is compelled to occupy,
