Something New Here.

Perhaps not one in a hundred of our population ever saw a logging engine in operation until yesterday afternoon, when one of the two recently manufactured by Alexander Dunbar & Sons Co Ltd was taken out of the shop and given a trial trip down through town as far as the bridge. As the monster came puffing along it was a great sight. Huge columns of smoke were pouring from the smokestack. The cab was filled with men and boys, while in front were a couple of men looking after the steering gear. Behind, a score or two of youngsters were hanging to a sled, taken in tow by the big locomotive, which on the level moved along about eight miles an hour. This immense piece of machinery, larger than a railway engine, and greatly resembling one, is entirely the product of the Dunbar works, and is designed for service in hauling logs in the woods, taking the place of horses. Although new to our province they are used extensively in the West, and are worth about \$6000 each. Woodstock is and may well be proud of Alexander Dunbar, his sons, and their workmen, who have so often demonstrated the fact that this sturdy family in the mechanical line have no superiors and few equals on the broad American continent. They are the first in Canada to manufacture logging engines.

## OBITUARY.

At the home of J Judson Hale, Grafton, on the 22nd inst, Mr Thomas Keirstead, passed away, aged 87 years. Mr Keirstead was born in Kings Co, but lived in Carleton for the last thirty five years, twenty-seven of which were spent in Woodstock and Grafton. His wife died about 11 years ago and his only son died about 14 years ago. He is survived by two daughters, Mrs Judson Hale and Mrs George Vanwart, who tenderly cared for their aged father in the closing years and days of his life. Mr Keirstead has been a jealous christian from his early manhood. He became a member of the Reformed Baptist Church of this town on Dec 30th 1888 and has always attended the services up to within a few weeks, when with failing health he could no longer do so. The funeral services will be held at the residence of Mr Judson Hale to-day (Friday) at 2.30 p.m.—Com.
