If the government machinery were propelled by wind Mr Fleming would make a first class cabinet minister. Why doesn't he challenge Sir Wilfrid Laurier and be done with it? What's the use of bothering with Premier Robinson?

The Manitoba Conservative government recently bought out the Bell Telephone lines in that province, paying \$3,400,000. What a chance for our Mr Fleming? Why not challenge Premier Roblin to meet him in Winnipeg and discuss this great increase in the public debt?

If Mr Hazen and his party were in power we should have no roadwork to perform, no taxes to pay, we'd get free schoolbooks, fine weather, and probably free soup kitchens at every crossroad corner. At least that's the way the thing appears judging from articles in the Opposition journals. But the people can't be fooled that way.

Those who declare we should have honest government under Mr Hazen's leadership are careful not to say much about Manitoba, where under a Conservative government the provincial debt has been run up to nearly \$12,000,000, with a smaller population than we have in New Brunswick. Alongside Manitoba's stupendous total our indebtedness is a mere bagatelle.

Queens County, so long and ably represented by Messrs Farris and Carpenter, will continue to send those gentlemen to the Assembly. The Opposition candidates, Messrs Woods and Slipp, the latter a Fredericton lawyer, admit privately that they have not the ghost of a show to get elected, and are merely going over the course to keep their opponents at home.

In Fredericton the liquor dealers are trying to repeal the Scott Act, and all sorts of arguments are being used in the endeavor. The many strong points in the License Act are contrasted with the alleged weaknesses of the Scott Act, but the people should not lose sight of the fact that the Scott Act is designed to stamp out the traffic, while the License Act merely restricts it.

We can give it on the very highest authority that the Opposition in Carleton are in a fit of the deepest blues. All along they have been harping upon the government's prospects but the fact is they are now greatly concerned lest they lose all three seats. All hope of Munro's election, if any ever existed, has been abandoned. Smith is depending solely upon a broken reed—the sectional cry, and is as good as gone, while Fleming has but faint hope of slipping in by hook or crook. They are on the run.

Very cheering news comes from Northumberland. John Morrissey, fearing defeat at home, is said to be anxious to run also in Restigouche, on the principle that a drowning man grasps at a straw. The government will have no difficulty in securing an able ticket. Those spoken of include Hon John P Burchell, Mayor Miller, R A Lawlor and ex-Ward Campbell, the latter being a nephew of James Robinson ex-M.P., who will doubtless give a hearty support to his kinsman. All these gentlemen, we understand, are available, and with such a ticket Northumberland will surely send four supporters of the present administration.

Some months back this paper considered that Hon Mr Hazen and his colleague Parker Glasier would have comparatively little difficulty in holding Sunbury. Recently, however, much has been brought to our notice pointing in the opposite direction. The government candidates, Dr Peake of Oromocto and Pelic J Smith of Blissville, are developing strength in a surprising degree, and all but the most bitter Conservatives now concede Smith's election. This young man, who by the way is a cousin to B F Smith of Carleton, is everywhere admitted to be the strongest possible candidate that Sunbury could produce. Dr Peake's friends are hopeful of defeating Mr Hazen.

Mr Munro, at the Town Meeting a few nights ago, told his hearers he had been severely criticized in town affairs mainly because he is a candidate of the Conservative party for the Assembly. We have an idea that Mr Munro would have come in for just as much had he never ventured into the political field. He cannot possibly show that politics had anything to do with criticism concerning the trouble with the Power Co., for the very man who in convention proposed him as a party candidate is a director and high official of the power company. The new Opera House is not altogether owned by Liberals, and more than certain Liberals drink beer. Mr Munro evidently wishes to attract sympathy from his party.
