Great Liberal Meeting.

The Liberals of Woodstock and Carleton County have a rich treat in store for Monday evening Sept 14th, when Hon Sydney Fisher, Dominion Minister of Agriculture and member for Brome, Que., will address a Mass meeting under the auspices of the Young Liberal Club, in the Hayden-Gibson Theatre, Woodstock. The minister of Agriculture is one of the best platform speakers in the County. Himself a practical farmer, he is closely in touch with the needs of the agricultural population, and on all sides is admitted to be the best minister of agriculture the Dominion has ever had. In addition to Hon Mr Fisher it is confidently anticipated that other outside speakers will be present. As this will be an excellent opportunity of hearing the great questions of the day discussed it is urgently requested that every liberal in the County who may find it at all possible to attend, shall do so.

The meeting will be under the auspices of the Young Liberal Club.

Trouble in St John.

The St John conservatives met Monday night, and after much squabbling nominated Dr A W MacRae as colleague of Dr J W Daniel. This cheerful combination of a legal doctor and a sawbones will scarcely receive the enthusiastic support which men like W H Thorne, W S Fisher, H A Powell or even W Frank Hatheway could command. It looks as if no real first class fighting man cared to go up against the Minister of Public Works. Mr H A Powell at one time had the inside track leading to the nomination, but certain side issues affected him rather adversely.

The Exhibition.

The Woodstock Exhibition promises to be on a scale far superior to other years. The prize list has been issued, and the prize money is larger than ever before. It has been decided to have a School Children's Exhibit also, and energetic committees are at work in all directions. There will be a grand programme of sports, open to the county, the running events being 100, 220, 440, 880 and mile. The jumps and weight putting will also be provided for, and the proceedings terminate with a marathon event. The people may rest assured that this year's show will have all the big features. The Elections.

Candidates are now in the field, or practically so, in the liberal interest, in this province, for the counties of Restigouche, Gloucester, Northumberland, Kent, Westmorland, Kings and Albert, Queens and Sunbury, Carleton and Victoria. York chose a candidate, but he was compelled by the condition of his health to retire, and the work must be done over again. St John has not chosen its candidates, but it may be naturally assumed that Hon Mr Pugsley will be selected for one of the two seats. In this province all of the present members, liberal and conservative, are again in the running. The North Shore counties, Restigouche, Gloucester, Northumberland, and Kent, have nominated their present representatives on their record, and they very properly do so, for these gentlemen are faithful in the performance of duty, and constant in their attendance upon Parliament. They work harmoniously together, and the long stretch of our province which they represent is in excellent hands. Hon Mr Emmerson is again selected for Westmorland, and his ministerial experience is very valuable. Mr Carvell, than whom no man, from any constituency in the Dominion, has done harder work or more of it for his party, is again in the field for Carleton. Success will mean much for him and for the province in the near future. Mr Michaud, who is in the field for Victoria, has not been in the present House its full term, but he has proved an excellent member, and what is said of the North Shore group will apply to him. Mr Turgeon, of Gloucester; Mr LeBlanc, of Kent, and Mr Michaud, of Victoria, are three Acadian members who are good types of representatives.—St John Globe.

The Campaign.

Charlotte Liberal and St John Conservatives selected candidates last evening. The parties have been talking about the fray for some time, and now they have begun to prepare for it with a rush, both sides apparently being convinced that the election writs will be issued within a few weeks. In New Brunswick, if we count the constituencies in which candidates have been formally chosen by conventions or are already in the field by right of possession, it will be seen that only a few men remain to be chosen, and in some counties their names are not hard to guess. In York the Liberals will, at once select a man to replace Mr Whitehead whose withdrawal creates an unexpected vacancy. The Conservatives talk of Mr Mott for Restigouche, of Dr Bourque for Kent, of Mr Witzell for Gloucester, and of one of the local members for Victoria-Madawaska. In St John city the Liberals have yet to nominate a candidate, but many names are mentioned, among them those of Messrs A P Barnhill, F J G Knowlton, Edward Lantallum and Mayor Bullock. The number of candidates remaining to be selected is small considering that there is still no positive declaration as to the date of the contest, but the sustained activity on both sides means that the date will soon be known.—Telegraph

W F Todd in Charlotte.

At a large and very representative liberal convention held in St Stephen Monday afternoon W F Todd was unanimously nominated to contest Charlotte for the Commons. He is an exceptionally strong candidate, and it will be no great surprise should his majority run well up to five or six hundred. Since 1896 Charlotte has unfortunately been in opposition, but there are many indications pointing in the direction of liberal success. We congratulate the party in Charlotte upon securing such an excellent candidate. Mr Todd sat one term in the legislature, leading the poll, an incidentally helped to snow under the "big four", —Clarke, Grimmer, Hartt and Chipman.

Tory Alleged Purity.

It must be significant that the Tories of Halifax, imitating the Tories of Colchester, are starting their campaign with a pledge that the election shall be conducted with strict adherence to the law. At the very moment that the Tories in Colchester were passing a similar resolution the investigation in Truro disclosed that prominent members of that party were handing out money in sums of \$15.00 to \$45.00 to each voter and whiskey in quantities of from six and eight bottles to thirty-six flasks. Is there any reason to believe that the Tories of Halifax contemplate any different procedure?—Ottawa Free Press.

The Fredericton Herald pays its respects to Mr Hazen, the Premier of New Brunswick:—"Mr Hazen in his speech to the Halifax Tory convention Wednesday gloried in what he called the Conservative sweep in the New Brunswick Provincial elections, and yet immediately after that contest Mr Hazen gave liberals credit for uniting with his own party friends in giving him the victory, and during the elections he pleaded for Liberal support on the ground that his Government would not know Federal party lines. At the time The Herald warned its Liberal friends that if Mr Hazen won his victory would be proclaimed as a Liberal defeat, and so it has happened. When Mr Hazen next presents himself for the endorsement of the electors Liberals will know what to do, and it will not be to continue in power a straight Tory Government which is proving false to all its pledges."

A Lost Angel.

Where is John McKane, the angel of the Conservative Party in New Brunswick? His gold was water to that thirsty land when water was needed. The party drank deep from his well of hope and was revived, and things changed, and the Hazen Government got in, and it looked rosy for John McKane, who aspired to be a nation-maker at Ottawa. Millionaire McKane pervaded the landscape. In St John they spoke of him as a greater attraction than the Riverside Falls. It cost a dollar more a day to have a room on the same floor with him in the Royal Hotel. If we remember rightly, John McKane purchased a newspaper and started in to mould public opinion his way. But McKane is now heard of no longer. Into what viewless air has this angel with the golden wings vanished?—Colliers Weekly.

"It is true that the expenses of the country," says The Brantford Expositor "have largely increased, but not out of proportion to the business transacted. The Conservatives overlook this feature of the case when criticizing the Government. It does not suit their line of argument to present the credit side of affairs. Let us examine this a moment. In 1896 the total trade of the country was \$239,025,00 and the revenue \$36,618,590. The deficit was \$330,551. In 1908 the total trade was \$650,793,000 and the revenue \$96,500,000, and there was a surplus of \$19,000,000. One must judge by results. If it be extravagance to increase the trade of the country from \$239,000,000 to \$650,000,000 and show a surplus of \$19,000,000, then what should be said of the Conservative Government which secured a trade of \$239,000,000 and came out at the end of the year nearly half a million in debt? If extravagance brings results such as this the people would be pleased to welcome more of it."
