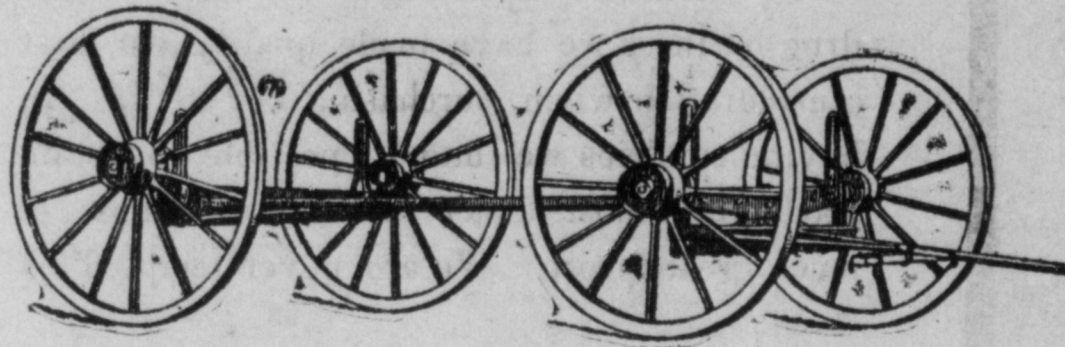

**The Great Exposure.**

The Conservatives declared they won Colchester by a campaign of political purity. It was claimed this victory was the beginning of the end for the Liberals in Nova Scotia, because Standfield's return was the solemn deliverance at the polls of an unbought and unseduced people. The entire province knew better, and the Liberal press had no misgivings in saying so. The Conservative canvass in Colchester was a dead-set on Charles Hill, the Liberal candidate, because the latter would not endorse the programme of a "No rum, no money" campaign after a fashion that would resemble the boy's "Hends I win, tails you lose." The Colchester Tories wanted to tie the Liberal candidate up to an arrangement which was intended to hood-wink the people. They knew the name of Charles Hill was the synonym of honest thinking and honest doing and they sought to get under the shadow of that name. A proposal was made to Mr Hill by the Tory managers to enter into an agreement to conduct a clean election. By this "move" the Tories got what they were after in the first place, namely—to be regarded as entitled to stand on the same plane with a man of Charles Hill's acknowledged uprightness, and as morally competent to deal on equal terms with that gentleman, in a word to be considered as square as he. Mr Hill saw through this hypocrisy and would not accept the Conservative terms, but instead proposed conditions which were the only conditions that should be acceptable to all parties desiring a pure election. The Tory management succeeded in their second "move," namely—to get the impression abroad in the constituency that Hill was opposed to a clean election. Then in mad haste followed the third and final "move" of the Tory management which was nothing less than a carnival of rum and money, without stint or limit, unparalleled in Canadian history. The Tories knew all this when they were shouting the Colchester victory last November. But it suited the game they played to carry out the hypocrisy down to and after the next election if possible. Now the exposure has come. The Tories are now out in the open and all alike are on to the shocking criminality of the whole affair. There are many Conservatives in Colchester who feel keenly the outrageous course of their party's "heelers" and who will stand behind Charles Hill at next election, should that gentleman again contest the country. The Tories forget that "playing with fire" is of all games the most dangerous, whether in politics or otherwise.

**Tory Hypocrisy.**

Greater political deception and hypocrisy have never been shown than in the Colchester election. The records of the court have proven out of the mouths of scores of witnesses that unlimited rum and money were used to ensure Standfield's election, and yet these pious Tories were all the time declaring that not a dollar and not a drop of whiskey was being used. They even fooled a great many of the ministers into supporting Standfield. But murder will out, and there will be another election in Colchester.

Dear Mr Moore,—It is with the greatest possible regret that I am compelled, by reason of the present condition of my health, to hand back to the Liberal party in this County, the nomination they so generously tendered me a few months ago, to be their candidate at the approaching election in this county.

At the time I accepted the nomination, I felt fully justified in doing so, but since then, the condition of my health has become such, that to enter upon the activities of a political campaign now, would involve great risk to myself, and it might prove detrimental to the party if I were to continue longer to hold the nomination.

In retiring, I know that a number of my warm personal and political friends will be disappointed, but when they become aware of all the conditions, I feel assured they will not blame me for taking the course I am now taking, and knowing that you will have no difficulty in securing a suitable candidate, I desire through you sir, to thank the Liberal party for the confidence they have shown me in the past, and request that you express to them my sincere regret that I am unable to render them further service as a candidate.
