### Hon Mr Robinson's Future

Political gossip is now much in evidence, chiefly concerning the future of Hon Clifford W Robinson. For some reason it seems the majority of those who should be well-informed seem to be of the opinion that he will not long continue in local politics. Mr Robinson was once a federal candidate, and is expected to become one again at an early date. Mr Emmerson is said to be in line for a lucrative federal billet, and Mr Robinson is booked as his successor in the Commons. Should this come about, the leadership of the small Opposition in the legislature will likely fall upon Mr Keown's shoulders. With the assistance of Mr Copp, Mr Sweeney, Mr LaBillois and others, the ex-Attorney General will be fully capable of making it warm for the new government. While everyone will regret Mr Robinson's leaving the local field, great things may reasonably be expected of him in the larger arena. Of course it may be that he will decide to stay in the legislature and have it out with Mr Hazen, but indications seem to point in the opposite direction.

### Mr Hazen's Duty.

"The immediate abolition of the office of Solicitor General, having in view the reduction of salaried members of the executive and the amalgamation of offices at present existing."

"The reduction of the number of members in the House of Assembly to thirty-eight and the division of the province in thirty-eight electoral divisions, each returning one member; the different divisions to be as nearly as possible equal in population, having regard to other interests; lines to be preserved as far as may be and the divisions into ridings to be made by an independent commission consisting of three judges of the Supreme Court."

"The reduction by at least one-half of the amount allowed by the Attorney General for settling succession duties, a substantial reduction in the cost of public printing, a reduction in the controllable expenditure of the province and such changes in the legislative and departmental machinery of the province as will lead to a substantial reduction in the cost thereof."

The foregoing are extracts from a series of resolutions moved in the legislature by Mr J D Hazen, as leader of the opposition, as "reforms desirable in the public interests." We heartily commend them to Mr Hazen for present consideration.

When he introduced those resolutions as the product of prolonged and deep thought for New Brunswick's welfare, the government of the day, indifferent to the public interests, coldly turned them down, to his intense indignation and dismay. Now Mr Hazen himself is, or soon will be, the head of the government and in a position to put into effect the reforms he urged upon his predecessors five years ago.

If there was need for those reforms in 1903 there is even more need today. We have Mr Hazen's very recent and very emphatic word for it that the province is in a bad way financially, that its expenditure is increasing out of all proportions to its revenue, that its debt is a burden threatening bankruptcy and that every possible economy must be practiced. Surely he will not ignore this opportunity to save immediately some thousands of dollars of absolutely unnecessary expenditure. New Brunswick does not need six paid ministers and forty-six members, or one for each 8,000 of population. Nova Scotia, with more business to handle than we have, gets along with three ministers and a member for each 12,000 people. Ontario and Quebec elect only one member for each 20,000.

Naturally Mr Hazen will find it harder to execute than to suggest reforms. He will rob his own pockets if he reduces the Attorney General's fees; but he will save money for the public. He will undoubtedly have trouble with Mr McLeod and Mr Grimmer if he abolishes the Solicitor Generalship; but he will have the approval of the public and of his conscience. He may create some dissension in the process of wiping eight legislators off the slate; but this need not distress him. Will he not be doing right?

The people have given you much, Mr Hazen! And from you they expect much. First of all they require plain dealing and honesty—and honesty and plain dealing require the fulfillment of these your admirable promises!—The Sun.

### A Johnville Pioneer Dead.

John Boyd, one of the pioneer settlers of Johnville, N.B., died at his home on Feb 26th last after a long painful illness, and was buried in the R O Cemetery on the 27th. Pallbearers were his Brothers William and Edward and four nephews. Fr Oughlin celebrated High Mass of Requiem assisted by Fr Murphy of Debec. Mr Boyd leaves one son William, and four daughters Mary, Kate, and Alice at home and Sister Nolasco of the convent of Mercy at Calais, Maine. Sister Nolasco accompanied by Sister Vincent was present at the funeral of her beloved parent. His wife predeceased him five years ago, also his son John and Lizzie his daughter, during last March.

Mr Boyd was a pioneer settler of Johnville and one of the party who assisted Surveyor Garden to lay out the farms of the Johnville settlement. He had also been Post Master of Johnville for over 32 years. Anyone who has visited Johnville will remember his kindly face and hospitable ways and he was highly respected by all who knew him. He died at the age of 66 years and a few months, and had lived at St Stephen prior to his settling at Johnville.—Conn. (St Stephen Paper please copy)
