

Naturally Mr Hazen will find it harder to execute than to suggest reforms. He will rob his own pockets if he reduces the Attorney General's fees; but he will save money for the public. He will undoubtedly have trouble with Mr McLeod and Mr Grimmer if he abolishes the Solicitor Generalship; but he will have the approval of the public and of his conscience. He may create some dissension in the process of wiping eight legislators off the slate; but this need not distress him. Will he not be doing right?

The people have given you much, Mr Hazen! And from you they expect much. First of all they require plain dealing and honesty-and hon esty and plain dealing require the fulfillment of these your admirable premises! - The Sun.
