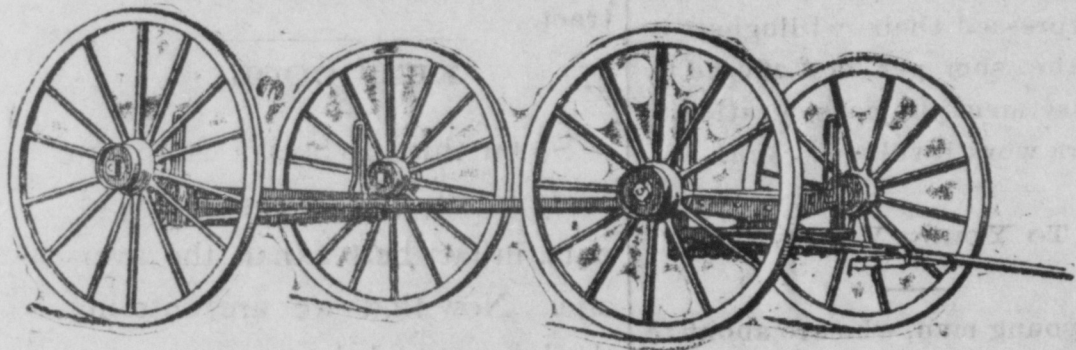

A Banner Meeting at Bath.

Bath, N. B., Oct 14th.—The largest political gathering ever seen in Kent Parish was that which turned out last night to hear F. B. Carvell and his campaign papers. McCready's hall, which seats over six hundred, was full and as has been the case with Mr Carvell's meetings, many were unable to get entrance. John Farley, stipendiary magistrate of Bristol, was chairman, and seated on the platform were many grey haired voters, life-long supporters of the Liberal cause.

County Councillor John E. Kinney was the first speaker. He said he had been a life-long Conservative and hitherto a strong supporter of those now in charge at Fredericton, but he had become thoroughly disgusted with that party which did nothing but talk. The great question in that locality was the erection of a bridge across the river. "Now," said the speaker, "that bridge has been definitely promised to Bath people, and Upper Kent voters tell me it has been just as definitely promised to them." He will vote for Carvell, not merely to spite the opposite party, who have shown themselves unworthy of support, but because Carvell had proved himself the stuff that parliamentarians are made of.

W. B. Morgan spoke briefly but pointedly and was followed by Frank Hagerman, who in his humorous way made the course of the opposing party appear ridiculous. He travels over the county selling farm machinery, and says that some time ago he met in one day three old Conservatives who had vowed their intention to vote Liberal and every day since then he has met other men of the same mind.

Warden Frank R. Shaw, in an

half-hour address, made a splendid impression.

Given Close Attention.

The candidate spoke for an hour and was given the closest attention until he sat down. Among the other topics he touched on was the local matter of the bridge. Some weeks ago there was a conservative meeting addressed by the candidate and local speakers. It had been announced that Messrs Flemming and McLeod were to be there. Why were they not there? Because, said the speaker, they feared to answer a certain question, Where will the bridge be located since you have promised it to both us and to Upper Kent? Neither Flemming, Munro, nor McLeod dare face the people of Bath or the parish of Kent at this moment.

Kent, which has always been a Liberal parish, is today solid for Carvell. Wicklow another parish, is rousing up to the fact that they want Laurier and Carvell for theirs. Throughout the county such is the word.

This week Mr Carvell will visit Peel, the home parish of his opponent. He will speak at Mount Pleasant on Wednesday and at East Florenceville on Thursday.

There is a rumor, the origin of which comes from near Florenceville, that the best friends of B. F. Smith, M. P. P., advise him to throw up the nomination and hold his present situation. This Mr Smith is said to be carefully considering and has openly admitted that his apparent support is too slender for safety. He also now realizes that he has lost much prestige by leaving the position the people placed him in last winter.


Messrs. Robert Greer and David Dykeman attended a meeting of the Liberal party at Debec, Oct. 3.


