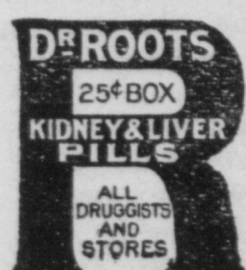

The Member for Wentworth.

Perhaps no man in Canada more richly deserved election last Oct. than W O Sealey, Liberal candidate in Wentworth, Ont. In the 1904 election he opposed E D Smith, the Winona fruit grower, and was actually elected by fifteen votes, but on a recount one poll which gave him twenty majority was thrown out because of certain irregularities, the deputy returning officer having failed to sign the return. The seat was accordingly awarded to Smith by the judge who presided at the recount. From this decision an appeal was entered, and carried finally to the Supreme Court, which body declared the election invalid, and thus vacated the seat.

The two candidates then went at it again, hammer and tongs. The Liberals relied too much upon sentiment. They felt that the sympathy for Mr Sealey on account of his bad luck in the general contest would be sufficient to elect him, but the Conservatives put up large quantities of the needful, and actually elected Mr Smith by about a dozen votes, a narrow enough margin. The Liberals were greatly chagrined, but at once resolutely determined upon thorough organization for the next general election. Mr Smith decided to retire, a step which proved eminently wise on his part, for in the October contest Mr Sealey swept the riding with a majority of over two hundred. His coming again into his own greatly gratified every Ontario Liberal, and it goes without saying that the hero of Wentworth will get a great reception at the opening of parliament.

The Dead-LOCK.

The result of the election contest in Newfoundland while it constitutes a defeat for the Bond government, does not by any means elevate Sir Edward Morris and his party to the "seats of the mighty." It looks as if a dead-lock between the two political parties was now inevitable and it is doubtful if a new election could materially alter the situation.

A big majority may be a bad thing for a country but an equal division of political parties it infinitely worse.

Staple government is necessary to ensure the progress and development of any country and staple government in Newfoundland under existing conditions is an impossibility.

The more closely divided political parties are the greater is the bitterness and hostility between them and from this distant view point it looks as if there were stormy days dawning in the political life of Newfoundland.

Students of Canadian history will recall that in Upper and Lower Canada, a similar state of affairs existed just prior to Confederation.

In the three years previous to the Charlottetown conference the rival political parties were so equally divided that a new government was almost a monthly occurrence. A political dead-lock then ensued.

Every constitutional method of solving the difficulty had been exhausted. Dissolution of Parliament and change of Ministry brought no relief. It was then and only then that the Confederation of the British American provinces became a possibility.

Hon George Brown, one of the foremost leaders of the Reform party, met in conference with Sir John McDonald and Sir Alexander Galt and the result of this conference led to the formation of a coalition government, having in view the adoption of a "federation" system, applied to either Canada alone, or to the whole British North American provinces.

By one of those peculiar accidents of fate, the question of a Maritime Union was then being discussed throughout the provinces down here by the sea and a convention was arranged at Charlottetown to discuss this question. To this conference came Messrs John A McDonald, George Brown, George E Cartier, A T Galt, T D'Arcy McGee, H L Langevin, Wm McDougall and Alex. Campbell and the larger scheme of a federal union entirely swallowed the narrower one. The Quebec conference and confederation shortly followed and no dead-locks have since occurred.

Both political parties in Newfoundland are opposed to confederation and surely it would be the irony of fate if the present crisis would in the end achieve that result.—Sun

Annual Meeting.

The Carleton and Victoria Poultry and Pet Stock Association held its annual meeting at Hartland on Nov 10th. There was a good attendance and several names were added to the already large membership list.

The following are the officers for the new year: Honorary President, Geo E Baxter of Andover; President, J B Daggett of Hartland; 1st Vice President, A A Belyea of Coldstream; 2nd Vice President, Dr R B Hagerman of Florenceville; C W Hurst of Hartland, Sec Treas; Executive Committee, Dr L De O McIntosh, C W Hurst and A A Belyea. The Executive Committee were instructed to proceed with plans for the annual show to be held in Hartland in Jan. A resolution was adopted urging upon the government the need of an experimental station such as is conducted by Nova Scotia, Quebec and Ontario. The matter will be taken up with other agricultural societies and joint action will be taken and the matter pressed upon the attention of the government.

Thus far the association has not asked for any government aid and now the members feel that their work has reached a place where they can justly ask for a consideration from the government. The President was instructed to further take the matter up with the government.

Duncan Ross Beaten.

Contrary to general expectation, the two deferred elections in British Columbia resulted in favor of the Opposition. In Yale-Cariboo Martin Burrell, provincial fruit inspector, defeated Duncan Ross, one of the best men from the West in the last parliament, by nearly 800 votes. The contest in Kootenay was between Mayor Goodeve of Rossland, cons, and Smith Curtis, liberal, with a socialist also in the running. The election went strongly in favor of Goodeve, who received about as many votes as the other two put together. Undoubtedly the result in these constituencies is a big surprise to all parties. The reasons are not at all plain, although it is conceded that the government's Asiatic policy is very unpopular with British Columbians. That province is overrun with Japs, Chinese, Hindoos, etc, much to the disgust of the whites, particularly the labor-unions, which in the West are very strong. The Japs, as allies of Great Britain, ask for equal treatment, and the British government always insists upon the disallowance of the restrictions enacted by the British Columbian legislature. This causes a hard feeling against the Ottawa government, of which they really are not deserving. Then the McBride government has a tight grip on the province, and went the limit in supporting the federal opposition. These with other causes as yet unknown in the East seem to have turned the scale largely in favor of the opposition. The only Liberals from British Columbia in the new parliament are Ralph Smith of Nanaimo and Wm Sloan of Comox-Atlin, of whom the latter was elected by acclamation.
