Sir Henry Joly.

Sir Henry Joly de Lotbiniere, whose death took place on Monday at the age of 79 years, was in his younger days a prominent and active citizen of Quebec and of Canada who took no inconsiderable part in the consideration of many important public questions. Sir Henry was a descendant of a French Huguenot family on his father's side, while his mother, whose name he received legislative permission to join with his own, was a granddaughter of the last Marquis de Lotbiere. Sir Henry was born in France in December, 1829. but came to Canada to live and in 1855 was admitted a member of the Quebec bar. Five years later he became a member of the Canadian Assembly and took a prominent part in the debates on Confederation, acting with Dorion, Holton, Huntington and the other liberal leaders. In the first general election of 1867 he was elected a member of the House of Commons and also sat for his constituency in the Quebec legislature until dual representation was abolished in 1874, when he remained in the provincial House, leading the opposition until in 1878 he was called on to form a government. This only lived one year and he then resumed his old position as leader of tue opposition, but in 1885 he retired from the legislature and took no further part in politics until the great liberal convention at Ottawa in 1893, of which he was vice-chairman. Three years later he was elected to the House of Commons and became Sir Wilfrid Laurier's first minister of inland revence. In 1890 he was appointed Governor of British Columbia and discharged the duties of the office is a manner that won for him the confidence and good will of the people of that province. While on the Pacific coast Lady Joly died. Sir Henry Joly was knighted in 1865 and it is reported that in 1887 Sir Johe Macdonald sought to have bim enter the conservative government, but that he declined a seat in the cabinet, as he had previously declined a seat in the Senate. Sir Henry was deeply interested in forestry and fruit growing aud in many kindred topics and was also an active supporter of the Imperial Federation League. In Quebec, where he was best known, he was universally respected. His death, following closely upon the neath in China of the Emperor and Dowager Empress, recalls the fact that when Li Hung Chang made his tour through Canada in 1896 Sir Henry wih the Imperial Order of the Double Dragon in recognition of the services he rendered the great minister. All who ever worked with to remember his uniform kindness, his gentle manners, his good temper, and his broad sympathy with men generally. In word and in deed he was the true type of the courteous gentleman.-Globe.

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
