The Young Liberals.

The old K of P Hall in King Street was the scene of an interesting gathering Monday night when pursuant to notice in the papers over a hundred young liberals met for the purpose of considering the advisability of organizing a political club. On motion Dr Kirkpatrick was chosen temporary chairman, and in a few words he outlined the object for which the meeting was called. It was unanimously voted that a club be started under the name "The Young Liberal Club", and that a nominating committee be chosen to draw up a list of officers for the approval of the meeting. The said committee after mature deliberation reported as follows through its chairman N F Thorne:—

The report was received and adopted. The President upon coming forward to take charge of the meeting was greeted with three rousing cheers and a tiger. The doctor said he was not anxious for office but since the young men had so signally honored him he would accept and do everything in his power to forward the welfare of the club.

At this stage a few of the older heads who had been invited to drop around began to come in. Mr Partelow Watson the well-known carriage manufacturer was invited to say a few words and responded with a rattling fine address in course of which he gave many convincing reasons why he was in favor of the liberal party and its candidate. Ex-Sheriff Hayward congratulated the young men upon their enterprise and wisdom in founding the club. He had been told that at the conservative nomination Mr Fleming had said some things about him. One was that instead of having removed the sticking plaster from his face it was really a mask that had come off. Well, said Mr Hayward, suppose we take Mr Fleming at his word just for the sake of argument and I can tell you and tell him that I am not afraid to unmask with J K

Flemming for in a game like that I have only one face to unmask and he has at least half a dozen. (Applause.)

Mr Carvell's appearance was the signal for a demonstration that fairly raised the roof. In the course of a brief and interesting address he impressed the fact upon the members that the old tory trick of pretending that the conservative party are superior in loyalty and capacity to all others is about played out. He was surprised that even at the Convention on Saturday one speaker had by inference intimated that the liberals were disloyal and unpatriotic. The tory party which in 1900 had raised the disloyalty cry against the liberals on account of Tarte and Bourassa, in the campaign of 1904 openly sought Tarte's help, and they have since virtually taken Bourassa as their local leader in Quebec. Mr Carvell said he was not present for the purpose of delivering a lengthy address, but would merely express his pleasure at meeting so many of the young men, who in campaign time are of the greatest possible help.

Hon W P Jones spoke briefly and well, emphasizing the need of organization and expressing pleasure at the action of the young men in founding the club.

Remarks were made by Messrs Stone, Allingham and others, after which the club register was signed by over 90. It was voted that the club meet each Monday evening at eight o'clock. At next week's meeting it is hoped that a particularly large number will be present, as the proceedings are to be of a very interesting nature. All Liberals are welcome to attend.
