Full Text of Order-ineCouncil Giving Up River Residents the Right to Fish Salmon with Nets.

Following is the full text of the order in council, passed by the Dominion goverment on the recommendation of Messrs. F B Carvell, M P., and W T Whitehead, giving residents of the river parishes between Crocks' Point and Andover the right to fish salmon on payment of a small license fee.

At the Government House at Ottawa, Friday the 5th day of June,1908. Present :

His Exellency the Governor General in Council is pleased, under the authority of Section 54 of the Fishies Act, Chapter 45 of the Revised Statutes of Canada 1906, to order that section 16 of said Act, which confines the use of nets for the capture of salmon to tidal waters, be varied, so far as the St. John river, n the province of New Brunswick is concerned, and that the following fishery regulation respecting salmon net fishing in the St. John river, shall be and the same is hereby added to the special fishery regulations for the province of New Brunswick, established by the order in council of the 12th September, 1907, viz:

SALMON NET FISHING, ST JOHN RIVER.

(g) During the legal fishing season for salmon, and subject to the weekly close time, it shall be lawful under the following restric tions and conditions, to fish for and catch salmon by means of ordinary salmon nets (such as are used elsewhere in the said river) in that part of New Brunswick, which extends from the head of the tide up to the bridge known as "Andover bridge," approximately one and a half miles below the mouth of the Tobique river:

(1) A special permit must first be obtained from the Minister of Marine

(3) Such special permit to convey to the authorized holder thereof from the first day of March to the tifteenth day of August in each year, the privilege of such limited net fishing for salmon during each alternate fortnight, that is to say, two weeks fishing to be permitted (subject to the regular weekly close time) to be followed by two weeks prohibition of such fishing, and thenceforward in like manner, until tne fifteenth day of August, when all salmon net fishing shall cease. (4) The length of net used shall be limited to thirteen fathoms.

(5) The fee payable on such special permit shall be one dollar. (6) The holder of such special permit shall also be subject to any con

dition which may from time to time be embodied therein. (7) The said special permit shall
