There was a special meeting of the Town Council Wednesday evening to consider the matter of J. Norman Winslow's claim arising out of alleged damages to the foundation of the Lynch Building. The Mayor was in the chair, with a scant quorum present, consisting of Couns Fisher, Sutton and Thorne.

The Board went into committee of the whole, and heard Mr Winslow. After considerable discussion pro and con the Mayor asked Winslow if he would accept half the cost

of a new stone wall fronting along Main Street, the cost of which will be about \$350 to \$400. Winslow wanted damages in addition. He says the street wharfing has injured his present wooden foundation. It was then decided to adjourn until Thursday in order that as many councillors as possible could look the situation over, and be able to vote accordingly. His Worship the Mayor was elected a delegate to the N.B. Union of Municipalities which meets next week at Fredericton.

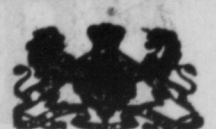

House of Assembly.

(OFFICIAL REPORT)

Fredericton, May 13th.
The house met at 3 p.m.

Mr Hatheway presented a petition from the St John Branch of the Canadian Women's suffrage Assoc to amend the New Brunswick elections act to include women in the franchise.

Hon Mr Robinson gave notice of inquiry concerning John McCormac's dismissal as caretaker of the Woodstock and Meduxnekeag bridges.

The House in Committee considered the bill for the appointment of a commission to investigate the Central Railway which bill met with some opposition. Further consideration was given also to the act creating the parish of St Charles in the County of Kent and a clause added providing that Richibucto and St Louis not in the new parish continue subject to their former laws.

The House in Committee also considered the Highway Act. Mr Robinson did not consider the appointment of a third member of the board by the government in accordance with the policy of the government when in opposition. Mr Hazen said that no criticism had ever been received from the public in this regard. Considerable discussion of the Act ensued. After recess the bill was further discussed. The opposition contending that the control of the Roads was not being put into the hands of the Municipalities.

Mr Hazen argued that the present bill was an embodiment of the pledges made to the people.

Hon Mr Morrissey said he had personally received many letters approving of the bill. Mr LaBillette claimed the Act would be a disappointment and not so good as the act of 1904.

Hon Dr Landry said the present government were giving the Municipalities the appointment of two of the members of the board, and he thought that was control.

The vote being taken stood yeas 28 nays 12, section 6 standing over for further consideration.

Hon Mr Hazen proposed that the rate of poll tax be \$2.

Mr Smith agreed.

Mr Leger, Mr Tweeddale, Dr Sormany and Mr Byrne thought that increasing the poll tax would do great injustice to the people of the province. After some further discussion the section passed making the poll tax \$2 and property rate 20 cents on the hundred dollars.—HUBBARD.

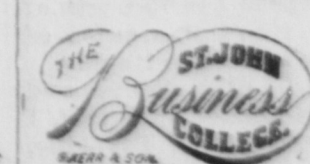
