### The Dundee Contest.

Winston Churchill, the dashing young member of Premier Asquith's cabinet who was defeated some days ago in Manchester, was more successful on Saturday in Dundee. In this historic Scottish hot-bed of Liberalism, Churchill won out over three opponents by nearly 3000 majority. Certain organs of the protectionist stamp in Canada have sought to minimize the importance of his victory, but in doing so have lamentably failed to bring about any result other than a display of intense ignorance of British political conditions. The two St John conservative sheets are in this class, but the Globe which is always well-posted very fairly sums up the result in the following words:—The more sanguine conservatives hoped Mr Churchill would be defeated. Others believed such tremendous gain in tariff-reform strength would be shown that the country would be deeply impressed. Although many things were in their favor, the tariff reformers were badly beaten. Mr Churchill had to run his election while trade was depressed, and in a workingman's constituency this is a serious matter. The brewing and liquor interests were solidly arrayed against him. He had to meet determined opposition over the education bill. He had to fight the tariff reformers. He was opposed by a labor candidate, and also by a prohibition candidate, as well as the conservative candidate. His victory by a majority of 2,709 is therefore noteworthy. That majority is 2,189 votes less than was received by the liberal candidate who led the poll in 1906, but it must be remembered a labor candidate came second in that contest, defeating a liberal. The conservative, or tariff reformer, candidate received 505 more votes on Saturday than was received, by the tariff reformer in 1906. This comparatively small increase in so large a vote must prove a great disappointment to the opponents of the government, especially as they had been loudly boasting of what they would accomplish when Dundee was called upon to speak. The pseudo-tariff reformers can find no comfort in the large vote polled by the labor candidate. Under all the circumstances it is evident that Mr Churchill won a significant victory, and tariff reform, polling little more than one-fourth of the total vote, was administered a severe defeat.

The Montreal Star, another paper which has accurate knowledge of existing conditions, agrees with the Globe. The Star says—

While the election of the Labor candidate would have left Mr Churchill without a seat for the time being it would not, have given the Unionists a supporter in the House. Labor is still more closely allied by far with the Liberals than with the Unionists; and thus it is most absurd, when considering the result in Dundee, to talk as if the Labor vote might be added to the Unionist vote against the Minister. A fairer test of the polling is to add the Labor vote to the Liberal, and present that as the strength of the anti-Conservative forces.

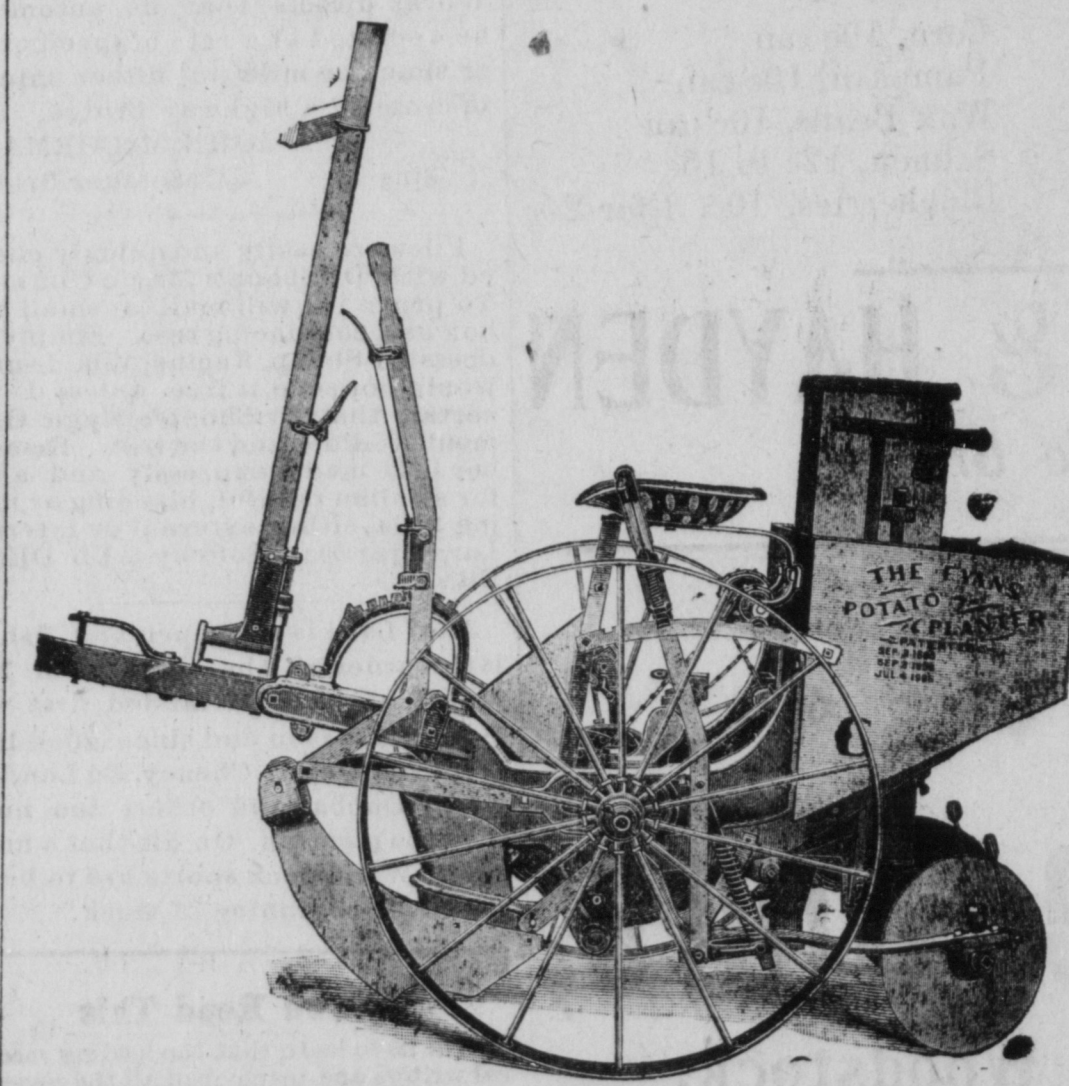
