The Convention.

As already a great many of our readers are no doubt aware, the first gun in the federal campaign for Carleton County has been fired, President James A Barter having issued the call for a Convention to meet in Woodstock in the new Hayden-Gibson Theatre, on Saturday afternoon, August the Eighth, at half past two o'clock. For the convenience of the up-river districts a special train going North will leave Woodstock after the Convention. The principal object in calling the party together is of course the selection of a candidate. Whether the fight may come this fall or later, we believe the calling of the nominating convention at this comparatively early date will be sanctioned by the whole party, as the history of past campaigns has clearly demonstrated the value of an early nomination. The Liberals of Carleton County are neither dispirited nor disheartened by the result of the last local election. There is the deep seated conviction that were it now possible to reverse its verdict of the third day of March the county would do it, and we have every confidence in asserting that the Liberal nominee, whoever he may be, will need only the united support of the party to achieve a victory quite as notable, if indeed not more, than that of 1904. We join with President Barter in urgently requesting every Liberal who can at all be present to regard it as a duty of the first importance. We hope to find a most satisfactory response to the call. Remember the date, Saturday afternoon, August the Eighth.

An Outside View.

The Liberals of Carleton county will meet in convention at Woodstock on Saturday, August 8th, to nominate a candidate for the House of Commons of Canada. Mr F B Carvell, M P., who has represented the fine old county at Ottawa for the past four years, with singular ability, is sure of a unanimous nomination. Mr Carvell's re-election by an increased majority seems to be a foregone conclusion.—Fredericton Herald.
