VALEDICTORY.

*Mr Principal, Members of the Teaching Staff, Graduation Class, Fellow Students, Ladies and Gentlemen :*

A few months have rolled around since we entered this building, and we now stand with our foot upon the threshold of the future, about to step out into another atmosphere of activity.

Some of us may happen to attend Normal, some the Business College, some the University and forsooth some will marry.

During our attendance here we have enjoyed many successes and many ambitions have been realized but at the same time we have had our failures. By failures I do not mean as the word is ordinarily interpreted but that we have not all together always reached our highest ideals. But oftentimes it is through our failures that we eventually succeed.

I may say it has not been our chief aim, nor that of our instructor that we should fill our minds simply with academic rules, but rather to mould a character which is far more important than any mathematical or scientific conception.

The past has fled with its labors  
its anxieties, its bliss and its joy—  
sometimes heavy eyed like Saturn  
sometimes blith as rosy-fingered  
Eos goddess of the morn. Let us  
glance over its fields and pluck the  
flowers there that bloom from wis-  
dom's massy stalk and virtues ven-  
erent stem.

And as we go out on the morrow to discharge our several duties whatever they may be, may it be our aim to fulfil them to the best of our ability for this is what the world and yea what God Almighty requires of us.

And in these days of ardent competition one cannot afford to do anything other than his best.

I hope the class of 1908 may never forget the years spent at the Consolidated and may we ever cherish the friends we have gained and good fellowship confirmed. I also hope we may never get so far apart but that some day we may meet again to talk over the happy days we have lived together, the realms of knowledge we have explored, the games we have won, our gibes and laughter and songs.

I would now like to say a few words in regard to consolidation, although anything that I might say may only be an old story but oftentimes it is the old that is most pleasant to the ear. Consolidation was first talked of in this and the surrounding community

tes in June 1904. At that time however there were six districts considering the question: viz. Florenceville, East Florenceville, Connell, Cogswell, Greenfield and Stickney. But in September of the same year when a vote was taken to learn the approval of the different localities the latter three decreed we think rather unwisely against the new plan. The others began in June 1906 to erect the building in which we are now assembled and in June 1907 the work was complete costing including equipment about \$12000. But the rate-payers of these communities do not deserve all the credit for this school which they have now in their midst. Much I consider should be due to Inspector Meagher and Professor Brittain, they being the men who first conceived the idea that led up to this Consolidation and who pressed their project forward until they saw their ambitions realized.

In a school of this kind there are many advantages and privileges offered that cannot be given by other country or village schools, for here we have gardening, sloyd, domestic science, a first class chemical laboratory, a piano and also a gymnasium while the pupils in ordinary schools are deprived of all these privileges.

Again we have as instructors teachers of the highest grade and quality, while neighboring districts must subsist with those of 2nd, y 3rd class license and sometimes none at all. Out of the twenty from her who wrote their entrance examinations last year, nineteen were successful and if you will take this as a fair test which I think you should, you will agree with me when I say that this institution compares very favorably with any of our advanced schools.

We have during our stay here taken quite an active part in athletics, which I consider is a large factor of one's education, and more so when I think of those three hundred spartans, who spending practically all their time in the gymnasium could repel the Persian hordes at the Pass of Thermopylae where they maintained their free Greek institutions in the face of degenerate products of tyranny and oppression.

On the Basket Ball floor we encountered our rivals for supremacy and glad to say the bird of victory always perched on our Banners. But spring we went forth to vanquish the Tartars in base ball, but the flock of fowl had fled in its place a mocking magpie and a harsh voiced crow chanted our requiem.
