Majority for Upham 98.

It will be seen that Mr Upham's majority is ninety eight, considerably less than at first supposed, due to an incorrect report from Aberdeen. It had been supposed that Upham carried that parish, but the official returns reversed the figures in the Foreston poll.

The Sheriff declared George W Upham duly elected, after which both candidates spoke briefly.

said words failed him in the matter of expressing thanks to his friends who had so loyally and well stood by him. They had won a victory against great odds. In conclusion he again thanked the whole body of the electorate for the kind manner in which they had treated him.

The head piece of the casket was removed for a short time. The funeral services were recited by Rev M O'Brien. The services at the grave were read by Rev C P Carleton, of Petersville, Queens Co. Among the relatives arriving from outside points for the funeral were Rev C P Carleton, Mr Louis Sharkey of Montreal, and Mr John Connor of Boston. The pall-bearers were: John O'Regan, Daniel Mullin, Timothy Collins, Thos Gorman, Patrick Toole, Michael Ryan. Interment was in the new Catholic cemetery.—Globe, 7th inst.

Foolish Protests.

The habit of protesting electors is in most cases a very foolish one, which involves trouble and expense without benefit to those who are responsible for it. So far as the four protests in New Brunswick are concerned, the Liberals did not want them, and if the seats should be vacated the Conservatives stand to lose one or both of those they now hold. A contest in St John would certainly result in the return of two Liberals, and Mr Crockett would doubtless lose in York. His friends anticipated such a result, and were strongly opposed to any action that would open up the constituency. In Kings-Albert there is no possibility of a reversal of the recent verdict. Why, therefore, the Conservatives should have persisted in protesting the election of Dr Pugsley and Dr McAllister is not at all clear to the reasoning mind. One would have thought they would not take the risk of reducing the number of Mr Borden's followers even by one. However, they have assumed the risk, and must accept the consequences, whatever these may be.

The statement is made that the determination of Mr Fowler to protest the election of Dr McAllister could not be overcome, although Dr Daniel and Mr Crockett and their friends implored him to change his mind. The result is a new feud in the ranks of an already sorely disorganized party. Mr Fowler appears to have allowed personal feeling to warp his judgment as a party man. It is obvious that his feelings are not shared by others of his party, or the election of all the Liberal members would have been protested. These four protests are not a result of a general yearning for purer politics, but of the bitterness and obstinacy of one defeated candidate, encouraged no doubt by a few of his close friends. The net result will be a further loss to that party.

There have been protested in other provinces, some fifty-six in all, with Quebec far in the lead. Nova Scotia accepts the popular verdict of election day and takes no part. These protests will give the lawyers something to do, and provide some news for the papers. They will not alter the complexion of parliament, unless by strengthening the government majority.—Times

A Handsome Building.

The handsome new brick building, owned by Gallagher Bros, built at a cost of \$6000, in Wellington Ward, is now finished and occupied by Jas W Gallagher. It conclusively shows that when the proper plans are given them anything can be done in the building line by the local men and lots of credit should be given to Gallagher Bros for the confidence reposed in our own town workmen.

The size of the building is 45x22 feet, with an annex, which is used as a granite shed of 70x20 feet. First flat is used as a showroom and workshop with concrete floors all through. This flat has steel ceiling of a nice design and handsomely decorated.

The second flat is used by Mr and Mrs J W Gallagher as a dwelling. It contains parlor, hall, sitting room, dining room, kitchen, pantry and one bedroom, all finished in up to date style and having hardwood floors.

On the third flat are four large and airy bedrooms, with a large hall and bath room all handsomely finished. There are polished hardwood floors with very nice buttress stairs of hardwood leading from one flat to the other. All inside woodwork is hand dressed and polished.

The building will stand inspection and it goes to show that the local men can do as good work (and should in all cases be given the chance) as the outside men who have been employed here in the erection of buildings during the last summer.

The contractors for the brick work were Steeves & Berryman; for the factory work, Carleton Woodworking Factory; for the steel work and gravel roofing, J E Wilson, St John; the architect and superintendent was Henry Post; foreman on the carpentry work, Wm Clark, assisted by David Stewart, Arthur Stone, J E Wilson and others; the plumbing was done by Fewer Bros, and the painting by Donnelly & McLean; the electric light wiring was done by Harry D Baird. The iron balcony made by Connell Bros adds much to the beauty of the house and to the credit of the enterprising firm.—Press.
