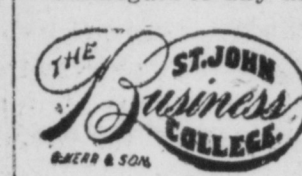

Canadian Pacific Railway Station in Manitoba or Saskatchewan, to and including Moose-
Jaw, nearest the point at which holder has been engaged to work. West of Moose Jaw
to Calgary, McLeod and Edmonton. Tickets will be issued Free to Moose Jaw, and at
rate of One Cent a Mile beyond. Or Coupon, if surrendered to Canadian Northern Station
Ticket Agent at Winnipeg, will be honored for Free Ticket to Canadian Northern
