A Mean Game.

These are the days when the slanders and organs are adding to their wild assertions about "scandals," the familiar old fakes which are being sent out by the hired man of the "tainted news bureau" at Ottawa, who the way, is now ashamed to sign his name to the slanders that he is syndicating. Last week the Tory organs were supplied with a story to the effect that Sir Richard Cartwright was being forced out of the Cabinet, while other equally false statements about other members of the Cabinet, were sent broadcast. The production of the "journalistic thug" was promptly nailed as false from beginning to end. Speaking to the Montreal Witness with regard to the report of friction between himself and Sir Richard Cartwright, Sir Wilfrid Laurier declared that the suggestion was ridiculous, and, with all the other portions of this sensational gossip about prospective Cabinet change, absolutely void of any foundation in fact. The statement in a Toronto newspaper of Hon A B Aylesworth having telegraphed from Vienna "that there is no betterment in his condition," was also made out of whole cloth. Sir Wilfrid was also asked if there was any truth in a report that Lord Strathcona was to retire from the Canadian High Commissionership in London with an earldom, and that his place was to be taken by Sir Montagu Allan. In reply the Premier said that "Lord Strathcona has not intimated to me any desire to retire from the Canadian High Commissionership. He did make such an intimation a few years ago, but I begged of him to remain, and he was good enough to yield to my wishes, and so long as his health remains good I desire him to remain." But the organs may be relied upon to pursue the campaign of falsehood and slander to the end. Their whole game is to lie the Liberal Party out of office. They have nothing else to offer the electors.

ST JOHN CONSERVATIVES ARE NOT HARMONIOUS.

Rival Candidates For Nomination Indulge in Some Warm Language.

An illustration of the feeling in the St John Conservative convention after the unexpected nomination of Dr A W MacRae, says the Sun, is afforded by an incident which occurred as the meeting was breaking up. The successful candidate moving in triumphant procession down the room, met H A Powell, who had strongly opposed his nomination.

"Well," said Dr MacRae pleasantly, "I suppose I can count on your support, Mr Powell," and he held out his hand for a congratulatory shake.

Get Your Land, Boys.

Ottawa, Sept 9.—Militia orders to day, contain the following:—The volunteer bounty act of 1908. By the above mentioned act the Dominion parliament has authorized the grant of dominion lands all volunteers (including nurses), who served with the British forces in South Africa during the years 1899 to 1902, and who at the time were domiciled in Canada, or who, when so domiciled, enlisted with or were appointed to Canadian corps, and arrived in South Africa for the purpose of so serving, but owing to the close of the war, were not on active service. Applications for the land in question should be sent to, "The Secretary, Militia Department, Ottawa," on forms which may be procured from offices commanding districts.

Home News from Abroad.

By reason of the acts of Inspector Colpitts in Carleton County recently many St John wholesale liquor houses are sufferers to the extent of several hundreds of dollars each. Under the amendment passed by the Parliament of Canada at its last session, "no wholesale dealer can lawfully ship liquor for the purpose of sale to any person or firm of persons in Scott Act counties in Canada." Disregard of this law means confiscation of the goods so shipped by such dealers.

Evidently the three firms referred to in this city were prepared to run the risk, for they each shipped, as before stated, goods valued at several hundred dollars to dealers in Woodstock. The inspector, becoming aware of this, hastened to the railway station, it is said, accompanied by his deputy and by means of an axe broke open the packages, which he believed to contain liquors. There were besides other packages broken open, that did not contain liquors, and the persons to whom these goods were consigned now propose to hold the railway responsible.

One of the St John liquor dealers who was sending to a druggist who has authority to sell liquors under certain restrictions has intimated his intention of taking legal steps against Inspector Colpitts for his alleged wrongful acts in the confiscation of these goods.

The same day the inspector had planned to raid some other places near Woodstock, but his plans in some way miscarried, for the places where it was supposed the liquor was being unlawfully handled were visited, but none of the ardent could be had. The supposition is that while the raid was being made at the railway depot the other parties referred to may have got wind of the doings of the inspector.—St. John Sun.
