Foster and His Tory Critics.

Some tory papers are perturbed
over criticisms of Mr. Foster and call
attention to the remarks of some
Liberals that he is not recognized by
his party and the statements of
others that he is the real leader of
the Opposition and Borden is only a
nominal leader.

After the insurance revelations, it
will be remembered, some of the
Tory papers were very severe on that
gentleman. Leading papers support-
ing the party showed up the land
transactions in which Foster, Pow-
ler & Co. had figured, and some of
the conclusions reached by these
Tory papers were decidedly unfav-
orable to the land-dealers. The Tory
leader apparently realized that these
Tory papers had good reasons for
their adverse comments; for, after
the "Dear Lefurgey" letter was made
public, he promptly announced in
an interview at Ottawa that he had
nothing to do with the transactions.

The certain Tory papers—especial-
ly one in Montreal that had been a
friend of the party in time of need—
warned the Opposition leader that
he must be careful about the com-
pany chosen to tour the country
with him in the interests of the Tory
party. Accordingly, some of his
colleagues were dropped from his
programme, including Mr. Foster, and
that gentleman went touring the
country alone. Apparently, Mr. Fos-
ter is not the kind of man who will
take rebuffs from his Tory critics
without making a persistent effort to
get even with them, so during the
last session of parliament he became
bolder than ever, usurping the po-
sition of Opposition leader and out-
talking Mr. Borden. There were some
rumors during the session that an-
other "nest of traitors" was soon to
be disclosed. The amount of trouble
that may have been brewing is not
yet known to the public, but there
is one fact that is significant; and
that is, Mr. Foster has been touring
the Maritime Provinces alone. It is
announced that he will also tour On-
tario—alone. Mr. Borden has arrang-
ed a programme of meetings and the
former Minister of Finance is not
included. In fact Borden has selected
politicians from the provincial legis-
latures, overlooking his colleagues
in the Dominion House.

It is not surprising, therefore, if it
is difficult for the public to ascertain
just where Mr. Foster and some of
his garrulous confederates stand in
the estimation of certain sections of
the Tory party. At the present time it
looks as if Mr. Foster was determined
to hang on to the party until shaken
off, and that Borden recognizes him
as an aggressive opponent who is
aspiring to the leadership of the
party. Foster by his enormous
stream of talk during the session
showed those Tories who have been
criticising him that he is determined
to take a leading position in the
party ranks, and that is apparently
highly displeasing to the Tory cot-
eries in Montreal and elsewhere.

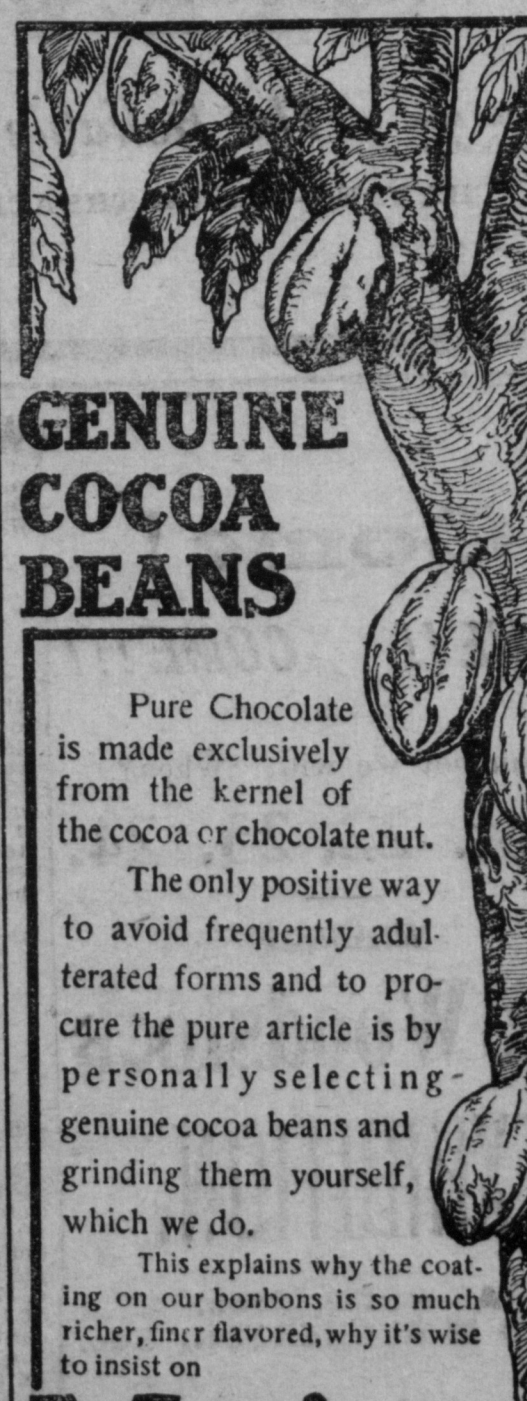
