Where to Amend It.

Premier Hazen speaking at Gagetown the other day told his hearers that his \$2 poll tax and 20 cents per \$100 Highway Act iniquity would be amended if not found satisfactory. If Hon Mr Fleming remembers that dog story he was so fond of telling in opposition whenever he talked on the road question we think he should know how to help his leader amend the new road law. If Premier Hazen will place the roads as he promised he would absolutely under the control of the Councils, abolishing the highway boards, so called, and in addition reduce the taxation, particularly the poll tax, his iniquitous measure would be far more highly regarded. But he would do better still to amend it right behind the ears.

Quite Apropos.

Hon H R Emmerson who made an effective campaign speech Wednesday evening at Moncton, said among other things:

"Dr McRae of St John," said Mr Emmerson, "is troubled because of Dr Pugsley's lack of consistency in changing his politics. The Israelites wandered but they finally got there, and I believe Dr Pugsley has gotten there too and will stay there. I believe he is a sincere Liberal today. Senator Wood was once a Liberal, but the Conservatives were glad to get him. Foster, when a professor at the U N B, was a Liberal and ran against Domville in Kings as an independent with prohibition leanings. Why doesn't Mr McRae turn his invective against Foster?"

And Mr Emmerson might have added others. The late Dr Stockton was a Liberal during all the best years of his life, and after he changed to the Conservative side, was sent to parliament with the support of Mr Foster and Mr McRae.

A few years ago Mr O S Crockett was an active Liberal and only deserted that party when the late Hon A G Blair, who had deposed one of Mr Crockett's relatives from office, entered the federal arena.

In the words of Mr Emmerson, "Why doesn't Mr McRae turn his invective on Mr Crockett?"—Herald.

Yes, why doesn't he carry it even a little nearer the fountain head. Mr R L Bordon himself was a Liberal up to within a few years of his entrance into public life, and not only voted but spoke for Liberal candidates. His signature may be seen on the records of the Liberal Club in Halifax. He blossomed out as a full-fledged Tory almost concurrently with the receipt of some big law business by his firm for the Tory government at Ottawa.
