It was anything to fool the people, and with his fake survey and display of hydrographers he hopes to fool them again. Mr Smith ought to be in the circus business. The confines of Carleton County are too narrow for a gentleman with so much audacity. He ought to at once get in communication with Barnum's outfit.
