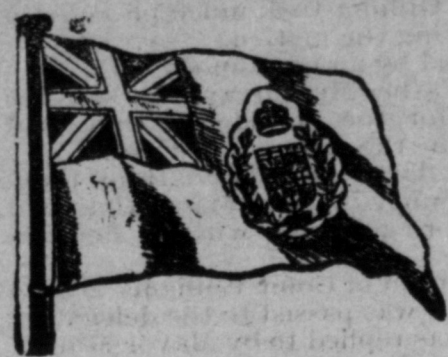

A Quarter Century

It was on March 3rd, 1883, that the late Hon A G Blair became premier, his first government being sworn in that day. On the 3rd of next March the electors will choose between the present party in power, which has held office since Mr Blair's accession, and the Opposition, which for the past quarter of a century has been pursuing a dog in the manger policy, thirsting after office, and always disappointed. The premiers since 1883 have been Hon Messrs Blair, Mitchell, Emerson, Tweedie and Robinson, while the opposition has been led by Hon Messrs Wetmore, Hannington, Stockton and Hazen. The Israelites of Old wandered forty years in the wilderness. The modern New Brunswick nomads have evidently fifteen years yet to travel before attaining the desire of their hearts.

Before and After.

The Press, as usual, is prophesying a victory. In spite of the fact that its former predictions have in nine cases out of ten been grossly and in most cases wilfully inaccurate, it is again merrily singing the same old tale of sure Conservative success. In its issue of this week it glibly states that "the government ticket is a sure loser" and in speaking of Fleming, Smith and Munro it says "Their election is assured." Our readers will pay little attention to these wild statements, but in case any might be inclined to regard the Press as a likely prophet, we will take a look into its past record. In its issue of Oct 31st, 1904, just four days before Mr Hale went to his political death at the hands of the present federal member, the Press was harping in this style,—"Mr Hale will represent this noble county four years more. The best authority in the county concedes Hale's election. The election of Mr Hale is conceded in every section of the County, except in the Sentinel Office, and the opinions there are paid for. The Conservatives will carry Carleton and Northumberland and have a splendid fighting chance in Gloucester, Restigouche and Kent." This is merely a sample of the utter nonsense and rubbish with which our contemporary was at that time filled, and we cannot see how it can have cheek enough to again impose itself as a prophet upon a long-suffering public. We should think that the junta who stand over the nominal editor and dictate such ridiculous statements would at length learn wisdom, and see the benefit of caution. It is surely far beyond reason to ask their readers to believe what they cause their organ to print. In the light of their past predictions the junta have more gall than sense if they expect their readers to put the slightest credence in the political forecasts given by the Press. How foolish the men who furnish the rosette matter must feel each time the votes are counted!
