The Government Was Never Stronger, Opposition Was Never Weaker

Sir Wilfrid Laurier Has Gone From Strength to Strength While the Opposition Has sadly Declined in Personal Leadership and Fighting Men—The Liberals Are Destined for a Long Lease Of Power.

There is only one respect in which it can be said that the Conservative party in Dominion politics stands in the same position now as the Liberal party stood after the general elections of 1891. The only point of likeness between the two positions is that the Conservative party, in entering upon the recent elections, had already been out of power between twelve and thirteen years, as was the case with the Liberals in 1891, and the appeal of the Conservative Government to the country in 1891 was its fourth under the leadership of Sir John Macdonald, as the appeal of the Liberal Government to the country in 1908 was its fourth under the leadership of the present Premier of the Dominion. There the similarity ceases.

The success of the Conservative Government at the polls in 1891 was recognized from end to end of the country as destined to be its last. The contrary is the case with the Liberal Government. The Conservative Government was tottering to its fall. Sir John Macdonald's majority of 21 in the Parliament elected in 1891 was a sad decline from his majority of 68, when he entered upon the Premiership in 1878, the year, in which the Mackenzie Government was swept from power. At each of his four appeals to the people, from 1878 to 1891, the great Conservative leader had his majority in Parliament successively reduced; he lost strength every time.

FROM STRENGTH TO STRENGTH.

When the Conservative Government was driven from power in 1891, Sir Wilfrid Laurier entered upon the Premiership with a majority in Parliament of 31. The majority today is 48, with one constituency yet to be heard from. And not only has the Liberal Government, in contrast with the Conservative Government, moved from strength to strength in the numerical magnitude of the representative character of the Liberal majority in Parliament, but in the composite representative character of the majority. Sir John Macdonald never had, after 1878, a majority as broad-based upon the will of the whole people of Canada as the Liberal majority elected last month to the great council of the nation.

But in considering the contrast between the position and prospects of the Liberal Opposition in the Dominion Parliament elected in 1891, and position and prospects of the Conservative Opposition in the Parliament just elected, the great and outstanding difference remains to be mentioned. It is not that there were actually more Liberals in the House than there are Conservatives now, though that is a fact all the more worth noting on account of now. It is that the Liberal Opposition was incomparably superior in every respect to the present Conservative Opposition. Beyond question it was superior, too, to the Government it opposed and drove from power.

A SUPERB FIGHTING FORCE.

It is to be doubted if there has ever been in any of the world's Parliaments an Opposition of higher character, greater ability and more effectiveness, than the Opposition at Ottawa in the years preceding 1896, led by the present Prime Minister of Canada. What a roll call of great Canadians is the list of the front-rankers of that Opposition—Laurier, Cartwright, Mulock, Paterson, Davies, Mills, Charlton, Edgar, Lister, Cameron, Brodeur, Fraser, Tarte, to name no others. It was a superb fighting force, superbly generalised. Mr. R. L. Borden, leader of the Opposition of the present time, comparing his position with that of Mr. Wilfrid Laurier, leader of the Opposition of that time might well liken himself to a man armed only with a weaver's beam, compared with the master of forty legions.

BORDEN'S WEAK CREW.

He has Mr. George E. Foster, it is true. He also has Dr. Sproule. Col. Sam Hughes deserves mention. And then there is Mr. Ames. This is the roll call of the ablest men in the present Opposition. Of course, there is the chance that some of the new Conservatives may turn out to be first class parliamentarians. It is to be hoped that some of them will. Mr. Borden is not only at the head of an Opposition which in fact numbers is inferior to the Opposition of the years preceding 1896, but he lamentably lacks men of first class ability to back him up. As a matter of fact, leaving the Ministers out of the account altogether, the remaining Liberals in the new Parliament are incontestably the superiors of the Conservatives in ability.

OPPOSITION NEVER WEAKER.

The Conservative Party thus has no such outlook as the Liberal Party had in 1891, when after having more than out in half the original majority which Sir John Macdonald had when he entered upon his Premiership, the Liberal leader found himself with more followers than Mr. Borden has in Parliament now, though the House then was smaller than it is now, with an unparalleled array of able lieutenants, every one of them a first class Parliamentarian and a power in himself, and with a Government, whose doom was regarded by the whole country as sealed, hanging on to office. The situation is in every respect entirely different with that of the Conservative Party, under Mr. Borden's leadership. The Government was never stronger, and the Opposition was never weaker. This is to be regretted, for there is need of both a strong Opposition and a strong Government. Each has its functions; and for the best working of our system of Government it is requisite that the functions of both be efficiently discharged. Mr. Borden, sorely in need of assistance, is thus confronted by an onerous task and one which he cannot face with any hopefulness of himself entering upon the Premiership until after many years have passed over his head. No Government in Canada's history has ever been more strongly established in power with better indications of a prolonged lease of power than the present Government—Winnipeg Free Press.
