Mr Flemming Discredited.

Detected in his efforts to deceive the public with regard to the provincial finances and unable to extricate himself from the awkward and discreditable position into which he has been placed by Premier Robinson, Mr J. K. Flemming is attempting a forced retreat under cover of a bluffing challenge to the Premier to meet him on the public platform or in the legislature for further discussion of the matter. His evident intention is to delude the public into the idea that he has something more to say, trusting that, before he is called to account, the absent-minded electorate may have forgotten all about the matter.

The public is not so "easy" as Mr Flemming seems to think. He will have made opportunities to discuss financial and other matters with the Premier and other Liberals on public platforms or on the floor of the legislature, should there be a session before an election; but in the meantime he cannot escape the fact that conclusive proof has been presented that in his recent discussion of the provincial statement of 1907, he either maliciously or with incomprehensible stupidity, distorted figures and grossly misrepresented results, making out the net debt increase of New Brunswick during the year to be five times greater than he knew it was, or should have known.

It has been shown that his estimate of the 1907 addition to the permanent debt (\$1,511,903.50) was padded by the inclusion of redeemed debentures to the amount of \$126,000, of treasury bills to the amount of \$806,872.53 and interest thereon accounted for in the 1906 statement, and by the addition of \$219,568.28 for provincial hospital and public work over expenditure, also included in last year's liabilities and paid out of the London loan made last summer.

The loan is another item that suffers distortion at Mr Flemming's hands. He represents that the province in addition to paying 5 per cent interest paid also 5 per cent discount, making a 10 per cent cost for the year's use of the money. The proceeds of the \$1,460,000 he says were only \$1,138,173.00, whereas the auditor general's report which he professes to be discussing shows clearly that the proceeds were \$1,387,139, proving that the total cost of the loan was something less than five per cent. There was no discount or commission attached, and consid-
