HAZEN'S CABINET.

The Hazen government was sworn in at Fredericton Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock. The new ministry is as follows:

J. D. Hazen, premier and attorney general;
J. K. Flemming, provincial secretary;

John Morrissey, chief commissioner of public works;

W. C. H. Grimmer, surveyor general;

D. V. Landry, commissioner of agriculture;

H. F. McLeod, solicitor general;

Robert Maxwell, without portfolio.

The appointment of the speaker of the house is a matter which will be decided by the government at a later date.

It will be seen by this list that the new cabinet will give the whole province very good representation both in point of the individuals honored, and with respect to territorial consideration.

John Douglas Hazen, B.A., B.C.L., is descended from Edward Hazen, who moved from Northumberland (Eng.) to Massachusetts in 1648; and more immediately from John Hazen, who, with his brother, William, came from Haverhill (Mass.), and settled at Portland, St. John in 1775. He is a son of the late James K. Hazen, and was born at Oromocto, Sunbury Co., June 6, 1860. His mother was a daughter of the late Hon. John A. Beckwith. Mr. Hazen secured his education at the collegiate school, Fredericton, and at the University of New Brunswick. He took his B.A. degree in 1879. He was called to the bar in 1883 and took his B.C.L. degree in 1890. From 1882 to 1890 he was registrar and treasurer of his university and at the present time is a member of the senate. He was elected an alderman of the city of Fredericton for three years and filled the position of mayor for two years. On Sept. 22nd, 1884, he married Ada, second daughter of James Tibbitts, of Fredericton. He moved to St. John in 1890.

In the following year, at the general elections, Mr. Hazen was returned to the house of commons for St. John city and county. He was an unsuccessful candidate at the general elections in 1896. He was elected a representative for Sunbury county in the local legislature at the general election of 1899 and soon after became leader of the opposition. He was re-elected in 1903.

James Kidd Flemming was born in the parish of Woodstock on April 27, 1868. He is of Irish parentage. He was educated in the common schools of the province. He resides at Peel. He was married to S. Helena Fleming in 1890. He is a Presbyterian. Mr. Flemming was first elected to the legislature in January, 1900, and was again returned as a member for Carleton county at the general election in 1903. His appointment as provincial secretary will be generally regarded as a most natural one and also meeting general expectation.

John Morrissey, of Northumberland was born about forty-five years ago in this province where he received his education. He is of Irish descent and a Roman Catholic. In Newcastle, where he resides, he carries on a successful business as a merchant. He was an unsuccessful candidate for the legislature at the general election in 1895, and for the house of commons in 1900. He was elected to the legislature at the general election in 1903. He is in Dominion politics is a mugwump.

Dr. D. V. Landry the new commissioner of agriculture, is a native of Kent county. He was educated at St. Joseph's college, and took his medical course at Victoria college, at Montreal. He has practised his profession in Buctouche for some years and is well known throughout the country where he is deservedly popular. He is a leading and representative Acadian, a very fine public speaker with a thorough knowledge of public affairs and public needs. He owns a large farm and is engaged practically in agricultural pursuits.

Ward Chipman Hazen Grimmer, surveyor general, was born in St. Stephen, Charlotte county, which he now represents, on Oct. 31, 1858, and is a son of George S. and Mary A. Grimmer. He was educated in Fredericton and took his B.A. and M.A. degrees at the university. He married Bessie E. Gove on Nov. 24, 1884. In his general election of 1899 he was an unsuccessful candidate for Charlotte county, and was first returned in 1903. Mr. Grimmer is widely known through his excellent record in the legislature and in his profession as a lawyer has a reputation for capacity and hard work. He was formerly Mayor of St. Stephen and also warden of his county. In religion he is an Episcopalian.

Harry F. McLeod is a son of Rev. Dr. McLeod, of Fredericton, where he was born on September 14, 1891. He graduated from the University of New Brunswick in 1891, as a first honor man in English and Philosophy, and winner of the governor-general's gold medal. He was admitted to the bar in 1895 and has built up a large law practice in his native city. He is auditor for York county. In 1895 he was gazetted a lieutenant in the 71st York regiment and is now senior major and second in command. In the provincial election in 1903, he was an unsuccessful candidate for York county. A year ago he was elected mayor of Fredericton by acclamation. The new solicitor general is an excellent platform speaker of great force and ability.

Robert Maxwell, the senior member for St. John, who enters the cabinet without portfolio, is a son of John and Eliza Maxwell who came to New Brunswick from County Tyrone (Ire.) He was born in Fredericton on June 17, 1858 and received his education at the Grammar school. He married on May 23, 1878, Pamela T. McConnell of St. John. Mr. Maxwell was an alderman for the city for seven years and has been deputy mayor and warden of the municipality of the city and county of St. John. In business he is a successful contractor and builder. He was first elected to the legislature at a bye-election for the city of St. John on Dec. 30, 1904. He has established a reputation during his legislative career and his wide knowledge of public affairs will be of advantage in the government council.

All, as politicians go, are young men, the leader himself being 48,—Mr. Morrissey the senior at 55, and Mr. McLeod the junior a boy bachelor of 37.
