

The general election cannot be very far in the distance, and all members of the party who feel that their presence at the Convention might aid in forwarding the object for which it is called, should make it a point to be present.







> > Henry C Sharp Dead.

Henry C Sharp, one of the most prominent and best known men in Aroostook, died at his home in Monticello, Saturday, after an illness of several months with heart trouble. Probably no man was more widely known in the business centers of Eastern Maine than was the deceased. He was born in Jacksontown. N B about seventy-four years ago. He settled in Monticello in 1873 and entered the lumber business which he followed actively to within five years when he disposed of his interests to his son, Harry B Sharp. Beside the lumber business he conducted a large farm which is considered one of the best in Aroostook.

Mr Sharp was prominently identified with the political life of Aroostook. He was a staunch republican and was always active in its interests. Four years he filled the office of sheriff of Aroostook and during that time his department was most efficiently maintained. He represented his legislative class several terms, and was one of Aroostook's senators for two terms.-Pioneer.

Mrs Arthur Bell.

Mrs Arthur Bell died on Feb 13th, at the home of her son John, in Woodlawn. She was 82 yrs old, and is survived by four sons and two daughters,-John, Alexander, Henry and George, Mrs Samuel Strong and Mrs Wm Wilson. The remains were interred at Woodlawn, the funeral services being conducted by Rev Harry Harrison B A of Debec. Her maiden name was Sarah Campbell.
