What the "Star" Says.

The Montreal Daily Star (Cons.) in its issue of Wednesday said that a great many people might be willing to vote for Borden for Premier, but could not support Borden plus Foster plus the Plum Tree Club.

The vital weakness of the Conservative party in this campaign is the fact that save only its leader who is apparently exempt, every other man of prominence in its ranks is either a legacy from the old dead-wood which was kicked out in 1896 or has become mixed up in transactions which the average man may look for among speculative gamblers, but will not tolerate among statesmen.

The utter helplessness of the conservative party in Quebec, where outside of Montreal Island scarcely a decent show of opposition is being put up against the Laurier candidates, seals the doom of the Conservatives in this appeal. Ontario can't possibly be expected to overcome, or even come anywhere near overcoming, the Quebec vote. The West is hopelessly lost to the Conservative party, while the Maritime Provinces show very little indication of affording comfort to Mr Borden.

FREDERICTON, N. B., Oct. 21.—James Robinson, Conservative ex-M. P. for Northumberland, returned this afternoon from the west, having been as far as Regina, and left for his home at Millerton this evening, and who when at Winnipeg gave an interview to the Free Press of that city, in which he confidently predicted the return of ten Liberals and three Conservatives in New Brunswick, gave to The Sun correspondent an equally rosy report of political conditions west of Lake Superior.

Mr Robinson declares that Laurier will win the large majority of western seats, and this belief he has formed from contact with men of both parties. He spoke of the powerful influence of Hon Clifford Sifton, who is regarded as the man above all others who brought the great stream of immigration to the west with its flow of wealth. This was a great force in determining the people out there to vote for the government, and another great factor to the same end is the transcontinental railway, which the west hails as the means of breaking up the railway monopoly that has existed there for years.

Mr Robinson had no hesitation in declaring that the west is for Laurier.
