### Hazen a Winner!

Flemming, Smith and Munro Carry Carleton.

"We have met the enemy, and we are theirs."

The above historic dispatch rather aptly conveys the sentiments of the supporters of the Robinson government. On Tuesday the contending hosts lined up for battle. When the smoke cleared away, it was seen that the administration had been thoroughly routed, the followers of Mr Hazen in the new house numbering 81, with 10 straight followers of Mr Robinson, and five independent Liberals, attached to neither party, yet practically certain to oppose the new government. It was apparent that in the legislature Mr Hazen's following was exactly outnumbered the opposition two to one, making allowance for the speaker.

It will be seen that Peel, Brighton, Aberdeen and Wicklow went very strongly against the government. Money and rum contributed thereto, as well as the influence of the Reform Association,—a strange combination, yet very effective, as the returns prove. Scores of Liberals voted the straight opposition ticket, giving as their reason that fearful bogey, the Road Law. Here in town as usual the railway vote was manipulated so that practically every man suspected of favoring the government ticket was sent out on the line, while those known to be conservative were given every facility for getting to the polls. In addition the lists had been more carefully looked after by the conservatives, and the county secretary's new powers under the recent legislation concerning additions were also taken full advantage of by the opposition all through the closing weeks of the campaign. When everything is taken into consideration, and in view of the terrific odds faced by Messrs Jones, Carvell and Upham, the result is by no means something of which they need be ashamed. The vote, while some 500 greater than in 1903, falls a long way short of the total in 1904 when Carvell beat Hale. All over the county the best of good feeling was in evidence throughout the day. There was wonderful enthusiasm in town as news of victory came to the conservatives. Bonfires were lighted,

a special train was sent up-river for Smith and Flemming, and a grand celebration kept up until after midnight. The Liberals took their medicine like men, and the general verdict even among the conservatives is that the defeated party proved themselves excellent losers.
