Seed Wheat.

O M Sherwood, Centreville, is importing the 2nd lot of "White Fire" Seed Wheat this winter.

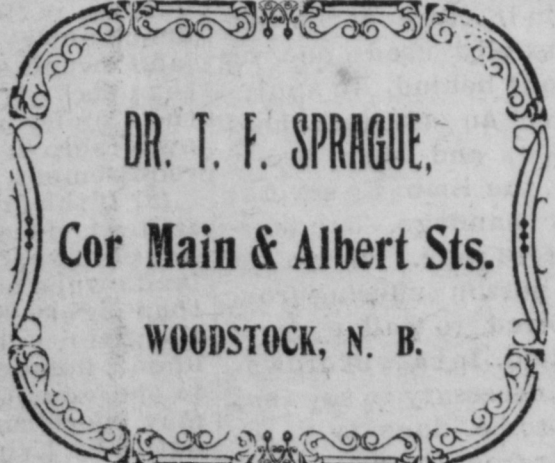
