In another part of this issue of the Sentinel will be found a report of the brutal murder of the peddler near Plaster Rock by two Italians for the sole purpose of robbery. A more deliberate cold-blooded murder can hardly be found in the criminal records of any country, and the Counties of Victoria and Carleton are to be congratulated on having officers with the pluck and ability to follow up these criminals as speedily as was done in this case.

It must make some of the small sized politicians of Carleton County such as Flemming et al, feel small even in their own estimation, when for petty political s it they attempted to dismiss from the service of the County such an officer as A. R. Foster, the man who actually made the arrest in this case, although twenty-four hours behind the others in arriving on the scene. Fortunately the Dominion authorities recognized his worth and his services were retained to the County, with the result that within thirty hours of the murder, although seventy miles away, he succeeded in landing his men.

These assaults and murders by foreigners on the line of the G. P. T. are becoming altogether too common and it is time the Provincial authorities were doing something to show these desperadoes that these crimes will certainly be followed by retribution. We sincerely hope that no time will be lost in bringing these men to trial, and that speedy justice may be meted out to them as a warning to others of the same class. And we respectfully suggest to the Attorney General that he employ eminent counsel for the prosecution, if he can't attend to it himself, and leave it to Harry McLeod to be bungled as he has done with every important criminal case with which he has been connected up to the present time.

The Canadian Club of Carleton County.

The committee appointed at a citizens meeting some weeks ago to take steps for the formation of a Canadian Club have been quietly carrying on their work. A good deal of time and thought have been given to complete the constitution. This was finally adopted at a largely attended meeting of the executive on Monday last.

Five hundred copies of this and an equal number of forms of application for membership have been ordered to be printed.

The aims of the society as set forth in the constitution are as follows:—

It is the purpose of the club to foster patriotism by encouraging the study of the institutions, history, arts, literature and resources of Canada, to promote good citizenship and true loyalty by any reasonable means within its power, to endeavor to raise the standard of public life by using its influence to have only men of unquestioned morality and integrity chosen to fill positions of public trust, and by endeavoring to unite Canadians in such work for the welfare and progress of the Dominion as may be desirable and expedient; and the society in its individual and collective capacity pledges itself to all its best endeavors to prevent the violation of the election law of Canada and of New Brunswick, or of any other law, the violation of which would cause the standard of citizenship to be lowered.

Such objects should commend the Canadian Club to the support and approbation of all.

An Effective Officer.

The courageous police officer, who captured the Italian murderers of Pedlar Green in the Tobique woods, was one of the Liberal victims of the Hazen government. There is no braver, more astute and successful man in the police employ in this province than Mr. Albion R. Foster, who faced the murderers in that lonely shack, and put the irons on them. Mr. Foster was for some years the efficient deputy sheriff of Carleton, and in that capacity was a terror to evil doers. His splendid detective work in the Gae and Cammack murder was not forgotten, and in every situation in which he found himself as an instrument in enforcing the laws of the land, Mr. Foster proved his courage and his worth, but even his splendid record as an officer would not stand against the greedy desire of the Hazen government to lop off the heads of Liberals and shortly after that blundering administration came into power, Mr. Foster found his occupation as deputy sheriff gone.

He was too good a man, however, to be lost to the detective service of New Brunswick, and Hon. L. P. Harris, the Dominion commissioner of police on the line of the Transcontinental railway staff, in organizing his force, promptly appointed Mr. Foster its chief, and in that capacity he has done effective work in hunting down law breakers, his latest success being the capture of the Italian murderers in the wilds of the Tobique.
