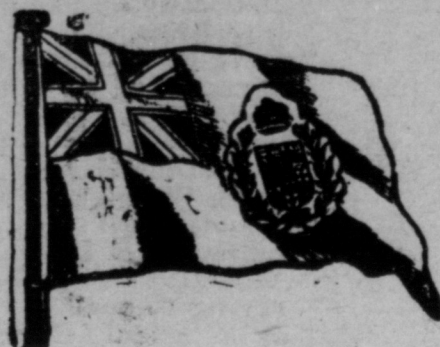

### The Party of Purity.

The party of purity, self-styled of course, let the cat out of the bag in Kings County last week. Over there it was expected that a certain medical gentleman, Pearson by name, would head the tory ticket. All went merry as a marriage bell until just before the convention, when a committee of three prominent workers waited on the Doctor and demanded \$1000 as the price of a place on the ticket, which of course was to go to swell the pot. The good physician, like any other honest man, declined to enter into any such agreement or holdup, and was immediately dropped like a hot potato. The story is true in every particular, in fact is vouched for by the party most interested. Since the exposure it is significant that not a single yap concerning purity has come from the Hazen newspapers.

### Underestimated.

Last week the Opposition organ was shown up in these columns in its true light,—that of a false prophet. Monday it brazenly offered as an excuse the following sentence:—"We merely underrated the size of the Carvell 'bar'." That's all."

We are not going to claim that the 1904 election was a particularly clean contest, on the part of either party, but if the Liberals had a "bar", their opponents certainly had a hoghead. Of course everyone knows where the tory money came from, and a good many know pretty nearly how much was used in the futile effort to elect Fred Hale. To start with there was that \$8000 contribution, supplemented by \$5000 more just before nomination, and in addition all that was raised by the candidate and his supporters in the county, as the records of the courts and the financial institutions have attested. The less the tory party have to say about money spent in 1904 the better.

### "Weak on Debate; Strong on Experts"

"The Premier and his colleagues are weak on debate but strong on experts."—Press.

This is remarkable, coming from such a source. We do not think Premier Robinson or his colleagues make very strong claims to oratory of the stamp known as boiled sawdust, the chief stock-in-trade of Hazen, Flemming and other tory spellbinders, but they are at least logical and convincing public speakers. They certainly are "strong on experts," evidence of which is furnished by the Premier's challenge to the Opposition to have the provincial accounts examined by independent auditors, which was refused by Mr Hazen and his party, who well-knew the utter baselessness of their cowardly charges would thereby be proven. The Premier, however, having driven Hazen and Flemming into a corner, is determined to show them up in their true light, and has engaged the well-known firm of Jenkins & Hardy, chartered accountants of Toronto, who were recommended as independent and capable men by that great financial institution, the Bank of Montreal. We will venture the assertion that when their report is submitted Mr Flemming and his supporters will find themselves in a most embarrassing position. Mr Flemming and his colleagues may be strong on wind, but that is their only stock-in-trade.

### Pounding the Postmaster.

An article in Monday's Press has a sting at Charles L. Smith, who it seems had the temerity to attend the Liberal Meeting Saturday night in his capacity as an elector, and was invited to say a few words to the big crowd, which in spite of the fierce storm, turned out to greet the candidates. In the report of the Postmaster's speech as given in the Press there is nothing at which any one might take offense. If office holders are not to have a say in time of elections we presume it will be in order for Auditor Vince and Secretary-Treasurer Hartley to stick close to their own hearthstones for the next thirty days, lest the Press may be tempted to chide them. For the benefit of those who love to have a fling at our Postmaster it may as well be said right here that Charles L. Smith owes nothing to the tory party, and no wonder, for on every occasion when he was a candidate he laid them low, and could do it quite as easily again. The Postmaster is a good man to leave alone.

### "Too Much Carvell."

From a tory standpoint we are inclined to admit there may be something in the cry now raised as a forlorn hope effort to elect the opposition ticket. In fact we are sure there is too much Carvell for the good of that party. One Carvell, how they love him, was surely affliction enough for these tories to bear, but mercy help us, another Carvell is in the fray! No wonder the wail goes up "Too much Carvell." When we take into consideration the many blows one Carvell has dealt the conservative party in Carleton we don't blame them a bit for throwing up their hands in holy horror and exclaiming "Too Much Carvell." The people of Carleton, however, will pay no attention to this cry of distress.

### Assisting His Brother.

A spiteful article under the above caption in the last issue of the Press calls F B Carvell severely to book for taking part in the present local campaign, as an elector and member of the Liberal party. The Press says "his conduct is an insult to the intelligence of the people." Wonderful, is it not, that the Press never condemned Fred Hale for participating in local elections, and also that it has no condemnation for O S Crockett, George W Fowler and other tory M P's who are taking a hand in this contest? In all fairness it must be said that any M P absent from his duties forfeits \$15 per day, but the right of an M P to speak to his constituents cannot be questioned.
