Fleming has been barnstorming on the North Shore again. What's the matter with Smith? Is this a case of somebody being slighted?

Kont, Kings Charlotte York and Victoria have placed winning combinations in the field this week, and Northumberland will follow suit.

Certain opposition organs speak with glee over the alleged opposition of a few obscure Liberals to the present government. Scratch a Russian and you'll find a Tartar. Examine a Liberal supporter of Mr Hazen and you'll discover a man with a grievance. Mark our words.

Woodstock Town pretty nearly broke even in 1903. A year later Mr Carvell led Mr Hale, polling the largest vote a Liberal candidate for parliamentary honors ever received in the town,—at least in the past two decades. This time the government ticket should have a lead of fifty.

The list of opposition committee-men as given out for the town contains the names of several gentlemen who have no more intention of voting the straight opposition ticket than they have of committing suicide. Indeed some of them may not vote for any of the tory candidates.

Everywhere Jones, Carvell and Upham are meeting with a most cordial welcome in their canvases. There are scores of electors who in 1903 voted for the tory ticket, and now declare their intention of supporting the other side. The upper end of the county is in particularly good shape. Five years ago the vote was very small. The normal vote came out in 1904, and the tory candidate was buried. Look out for snow drifts early in March.

YORK.

Hon E H Allen, Geo F Burden, Coun Clarence Goodspeed and R W McLellan have been nominated as the York Liberal ticket. The Pinder-McLeod-Robison-Young laughing stock combination were beaten about a thousand votes five years ago. History will repeat itself. To seriously contend that the Opposition ticket in York has the ghost of a show of winning is most absurd.—They will be buried.

Kings County Safe.

At the finest convention ever held in the County, the Liberals of Kings on Tuesday nominated three good men and true,—George G Scovill who has led the poll in that the last three general elections, Dr D H McAllister the most popular physician in the county, and Major O W Wetmore, the well-known farmer and fruit grower of Clifton, who is likewise an ardent military gentleman. With such a magnificent ticket it is impossible for any doubt as to where Kings County will be found. Fancy a combination led by Fred Sproull going up against the government ticket in Kings!

Purity Convention.

Revs G D Ireland, W C Kierstead, R G Fulton, S A Baker and H G Alder in co-operation with the recently organized Provincial Social Reform movement, have issued a call for a Convention to be held in the Town Council Chamber at two o'clock on Tuesday next to perfect an organization which shall have for its object the securing of an honest election and the elimination of bribery and corruption. Rev J H McDonald of Fredericton is expected to preside. There will be a mass meeting in the evening.

New Town Council.

Mayor Balmain and his colleagues of the new council held their first meeting Monday night. After the oath of office had been administered by Clerk Hartley, the Mayor delivered one of the finest inaugural addresses the ratepayers have ever listened to. He was followed by Couns Fisher and Sutton, after which organization was proceeded with, the following slate as submitted by the chair being unanimously accepted.

A number of bills and accounts were received, and referred to the audit committee. There was a slight breeze over the bill from the Power Company for lighting the town hall and pumping station, which is on a

meter basis. Some of the councillors favored securing a flat rate, and the light committee received instructions to interview the Company on the subject.

On motion, a list of persons in arrears for taxes, was read by the Mayor. The total is \$5952.50. There is a debit balance at the Bank amounting to nearly \$2000.
