Bath.

This village was shocked by the sudden death of Timothy Lynch which occurred at Love's Hotel, Glassville, about noon on Monday.

On Sunday it was learned that Mr Lynch was sick at Glassville and that Dr M E Commins and Mr Matthew Bohan of this place had been summoned to Glassville. At first no apparent alarm was felt about his condition, but early on Sabbath

evening he became worse and the stomach trouble, from which he had for several past years been suffering baffled the physicians. Mr Lynch was here one day last week and was apparently in as good health as he had been for a long time past.

Mrs Lynch was informed about 11 o'clock at her home in Fredericton of Mr Lynch's serious illness and left that city for Glassville at once on Monday, but on reaching Newburg Junction she received the sad news of his death and proceeded right to Bath, a few minutes before the arrival of the corpse of her husband from Glassville.

Everything possible was done to save Mr Lynch's life, but the trouble from which he had suffered baffled the skill of physicians in his last illness as it had done for years, and death came surrounded by kind friends although not in his own home. He was a kind father, a loving husband, and a man of kindly disposition. Mr Lynch had many friends in this village, and elsewhere where he was known. In business he was discreet and careful and the way he managed his own affairs showed that he possessed good abilities.

Mr Lynch was born near Boiestown, 66 years ago and followed the lumber business from a young man, first on the upper St John river. About thirty years ago he went into business on the Miramichi for the late William Richards. Later he purchased a saw mill at Nelson on the Miramichi and has since been operating in the woods of Miramichi for himself until a few years ago he placed his business under the corporate name of Timothy Lynch Co. Ltd and has since carried on the business under that name. His headquarters and chief place of business on the Upper Miramichi river has been at Glassville Village where he owns a large store and other buildings which are used as storehouses for lumbermen's supplies needed to carry on the lumber operations on the Miramichi.

Mr Lynch was one of the directors of the South West Miramichi Log Driving Co. Usually he cut from 12 to 25 million feet of lumber annually but this year's cut will amount to about 5 million feet occasioned by the general policy of curtailment in lumber operations.
