### TOWN COUNCIL.

The Council met Monday night, with all present except Ald. Smith, who is on a trip to the West.

The Report of Town Treasurer Bourne for month of April showed tax collections amounting to \$860.81. Total receipt from all sources during April \$1166.56. The Bank Debit Balance May 1st was approximately \$2500.

On motion the Town Solicitor was instructed to immediately bring to sale the properties already advertised on which the taxes are still in arrears.

Ald. Hagerman spoke concerning the Street Survey. He had talked with Mr. Murdoch of St. John, a competent official, and received an offer. He considered the terms, \$6 per day, as reasonable as could be quoted. On motion it was ordered that a contract be entered into between the Town and Mr. Murdoch.

The Mayor read a list of delinquents on water rates, up to Nov 1st, last past, amounting to nearly \$1000.

Ald. Hagerman characterized the situation as ridiculous. He saw no reason why 90 per cent at least should not have been collected. Seconded by Ald. Fawcett he moved that all persons owing for water have not later than May 20th to settle, and in default of settlement by that time the Superintendent be instructed to shut off the water.

A letter from the Board of Trade was read, asking the Council to convene a Citizens meeting for the purpose of considering the matter of urgent street repairs. The board seemed to treat this as a slight, for on motion of Ald. Fisher and Hagerman the letter was ordered placed on file.

Several communications from citizens who have alleged grievances were read. W. M. Connell wrote concerning damages to the cellar of his building in Queen Street, caused according to his contention by refuse flowing into the premises from the town sewers. He asks \$122 damages. This claim was referred to the Sewer Committee with instructions to report Friday night. L. E. Young, barrister, solicitor for F. S. Todd and J. O. Milmore, asked compensation amounting to \$200 and \$300 respectively for damages to lots owned by these gentlemen in Wellington Ward, in proximity to the town gravel pit.

J. Norman W. Winslow's letter covered three items. One alleged damages to the foundation, etc., of the Lynch building, another concerning the flow of water through his garden, and lastly a claim somewhat of the nature as set forth by Messrs. Todd and Milmore. He offered to accept \$350 without prejudice. Mayor Balmain acquainted the Board of his action in acknowledging receipt of Winslow's letter. In his reply the Mayor (after informally securing the views of the councillors) suggested a settlement on the basis of \$100. Nothing further had been heard in reply to this letter.

Ald. Thorne said the Town had generally been looked upon as an easy mark by anyone fancying himself aggrieved, and it now appeared as if the time had come when a halt should be called. These claims against the Town were becoming altogether too numerous for the comfort of the taxpayers and he for one would go for resisting them to the last ditch. On his motion the clerk was instructed to acknowledge receipt of the various claims.

A communication was read from The John McDougall Co., conveying the intelligence that a man from their concern was on his way here to examine the pumps and motor. On the suggestion of Ald. Hagerman it was decided to test the pumps Tuesday morning if conditions proved favorable and with Geo. E. Phillips representing the Town.

The Council then went into committee of the whole to consider the Beer Law. On motion of Ald. Sutton seconded by Ald. Hagerman, Section IV was changed by the addition of a clause requiring the signature of the Inspector to be attached to all beer licenses. Section VIII on motion of Ald. Hagerman and Sutton was amended by changing the retail license fee to \$50 and the wholesale to \$100. The penalty for violating any provisions of the beer law as set

forth in Section IX was made to read "Not less than \$20 and not exceeding \$50," on motion of Ald. Hagerman and Fisher.

C. J. Tabor, of the Carlisle, was heard. He wants to erect a fire escape facing on Main Street, but his present veranda will not bear the weight. Permission is sought from the Council to erect a portico which will be an ornament to the place as well as a necessary part of the fire escape system. On motion of Ald. Hagerman and Thorne the request was referred to the Street Committee for report Friday night.

On motion of Ald. Thorne, seconded Ald. Hagerman, Alderman Sutton was appointed Deputy Chairman of Street Committee, with instructions to take charge of work during absence of Chairman Smith. On motion of Ald. Sutton seconded Ald. Fawcett, the Street Committee got orders to buy some gravel from Colonel Dibblee providing terms were low enough.

Mayor Balmain informed the Board that requests had been made to him for the laying of sidewalk along Regent street from Main to the new Opera entrance, and in front of the Army Citadel in King Street. He considered these worthy matters for the consideration of the committee. It is likely the requests will be acceded to.

Ald. Fisher had a complaint that loafers congregate in front of the Army Citadel. After hearing Chief Kelly the matter was left in the hands of the Police Committee.

Ald. Fisher also spoke concerning rubbish being dumped near the intake at the pumping station. On his motion a committee was named to look into this abuse.

Ald. Fawcett brought up a matter to which his attention had been called. This was the fact that outsiders frequently come here and compete with the local truck teams. He desired this thing stopped. The Marshal promised to do his best to remedy conditions along the line suggested by Ald. Fawcett.

Bills and accounts were then considered. A great many were received and all except two from A. Dunbar & Sons Co. Ltd., referred to the Audit Committee. The Dunbar bills, at request of the chairman, were referred to the Water Committee.

James W. Gallagher and Stephen Green were unanimously appointed Revisors for the Town of Woodstock, after which the council adjourned until this (Friday) evening, when several important matters will be considered, among them the appointment of a Beer Inspector.

### Mr. Robinson's Speech.

The supporters of Hon. C. W. Robinson in the legislature, and his friends throughout the country, have every reason to feel pride and gratification at the matter and manner of his first address in the House as leader of the opposition, and that honorable gentleman was the subject of hearty congratulations on the effective and gentlemanly way in which he dealt with public questions.

While strongly resenting many of the false canvases that were made against himself and his party during the election campaign, he was able to show that much of the present government's program is but a continuation of the late government's

policy, and in bringing it into effect the Premier would have the hearty support of the opposition.

The proposed new audit act, the repeal of the present highway act, and the decrease in the cost of school books, were all matters to which he (Robinson) had given attention during his short occupancy of the premiership, and in taking these matters up Mr. Hazen had paid a compliment to his predecessors in office.

The opposition leader took occasion to refer to the alleged land scandal, which Solicitor General McLeod had endeavored to develop during the campaign, but which died such a speedy death for want of proper nourishment. Mr. Robinson created great amusement at Mr. McLeod's expense when he expressed surprise that the solicitor general had not advised the government to immediately introduce legislation to make good the public title to the Victoria county lands, which Mr. McLeod had declared was no good.

The solicitor general looked very uneasy and perceptibly colored during the roast which Mr. Robinson gave him on the subject, while Mr. Pinder was observed secretly chuckling at the evident discomfiture of his York county colleague.

Mr. Robinson also effectively touched Mr. McLeod on his condemnation of the late government for having failed to sell provincial bonds, which as a matter of fact had brought \$6, while Mr. McLeod, as Mayor of Fredericton, consented to an arrangement to dispose of Fredericton bonds at 85. Mr. Robinson might have added that the deal would have gone through, but that it was held up by the indignant ratepayers of the city, who forced the then Mayor and council to cancel the agreement with the Bank of Nova Scotia.
