Mr Robinson also effectively touch-

ed Mr McLeod on his condemnation of the late government for having failed to sell provincial bonds, which as a matter of fact had brought 96. while Mr McLeod, as Mayor of Fredericton, consented to an arrange ment to dispose of Fredericton bonds at 85. Mr. Robinson might have added that the deal would have gone through, but that it was held up by the indignant ratepayers of the city, who forced the then Mayor and council to cancel the agreement with the Bank of Nova Scotia.




