## The New Highway Act.

We have received a copy of the new Highway Act, which Premier Hazen introduced on the first day of the session. From what had been promised the country naturally expected something a little out of the ordinary, but it seems we are doomed to disappointment for on examination this new law proves in the main a mere reshuffle of the old law, with the addition of several features which cannot have any effect other than to render conditions still more unsatisfactory. The outstanding feature is of course that clause which provides for the creation of what is to be called a Highway Board for each parish, which body shall have full control of the roads in their parish. The two county councillors are to be ex-officio members, while the third member is appointed by the local government, thereby affording opportunity to reward a patriot in each parish at the expense of the taxpayers, and to insure tory domination in parishes such as Richmond and Wilmet where the councillors are of opposite political leanings. It is provided that these parish boards shall meet for organization within ten days after the annual meeting of the county council. Their remuneration is to be fixed by vote of the council, payable of course out of the road tax, but the salary of the government member is to come out of the provincial grant. Each school district is to be a road district under a commissioner appointed by the parish board, and if thought advisable even the school districts may be pared up into sub-districts, anything evidently being in order, always of course adding a few more paid officials.

In regard to raising funds, part will come from the government, of course an indefinite sum at the discretion of the Chief Commissioner, while the balance is to be collected under direct taxation, considerable latitude in this respect being given. It is within the prerogatives of the Board to permit the residents of any parish to perform statute labor in lieu of money payment, but of course it will be just as the Board decide, the individual must do as the Board may order.

The money collected is to be deposited with the County Treasurer, just as under the present law, and of course the collectors and assessors will also be paid for their services just as they always have received it. The main difference with regard to expenses seems to be that instead of having one or at most two Superintendents as under the old law, each parish will now have to support three well paid officials, who cannot be expected to give their time for nothing. The collectors, the assessors, the county secretary and the commissioners will all receive their usual percentages also, so it will easily be seen that under this new-fangled legislation at least one third and perhaps more of the money raised will be spent in salaries. How our friends lately come into power did weep when telling what great reforms they would give in connection with the road law, and what a

miserable make-shift they have presented! Mr Tweeddale of Victoria in the Assembly the other day rather neatly disposed of the claim put forth by the government that this new legislation would prove the panacea for all the evils in connection with roads. The astute up-country representative put the government at once on the defensive, and we venture the assertion that when this new law is given a fair test it will prove a most unsatisfactory and complicated measure.
