Holstein Cattle.

In an address delivered before the Agricultural Society of Yarmouth N. S. on the subject of "Dairy Cattle," Mr. F. D. Sterritt says in part:

Holland has for more than two thousand years been noted for dairy products and the great bicolored animals with which their reputation has been gained have been slowly but surely developing their present form of dairy excellence. And that they have remained pure through these centuries is demonstrated beyond all doubt. Even during the Roman dominion, although they brought improvement in draining and diking, in methods of cultivating and cattle breeding, yet no mixture of blood occurred with the inhabitants or in their herds. Mr. Houghton ably puts it as follows: "The preservation of these people and their continued adhesion to cattle breeding for thousands of years is one of the marvels of history. Always few in numbers, they have remained in or near their original home, continuously following their pursuits."

These few facts I think will demonstrate to you that the Holstein breed is the oldest pure-bred cattle living, and in respect must be classed first. In what other characteristics are our favorites first?

In size the Holsteins are the largest of all the dairy breeds; the big bony frames are well filled out. It is difficult to prevent the males from becoming too fleshy, and the females when not in milk, take on flesh rapidly, and soon become full in form. The cows range from 1,000 to 1,500 pounds, and the bulls often above 3,500 pounds in weight. The udder is large, filling the space between legs set well apart, extending high behind and well forward, and the teats are large and well placed. In temperament they are quiet and docile, bulls exceptionally so. They have great constitutional vigor. The calves are large at birth, always strong and thrifty, grow fast, and fatten easily. They mature early, heifers reaching their full height in two and a half years. Animals of both sexes can be turned into very good beasts for slaughter at any age. In these respects I think you must admit that again our favorites are first. But it is not their extreme age, nor their beef advantages, that puts them on a pedestal by themselves. It is their great capability for milk production. There is not a gentleman in this room to-night but will admit that for milk production there is no breed that equals the Holsteins, therefore we will not argue that point nor go into facts and figures which prove the average production of this breed to be 9,000 pounds per cow per year. But, I hear some one say, "How about the quality of this great amount of milk?" Well, it is nothing uncommon for whole families of the breed to average 20 to 25 pounds of butter per week, and single animals are numerous that have made over 30 pounds per week.

I went to the scientists with the question, "Which is the best food milk for human beings?" And I learned that the Holstein milk is the nearest in chemical composition and mechanical make-up to human milk that can be found. Why? Because its butter fat is put up in fine globules that facilitate emulsion, digestion, and assimilation in the human system. Its other solids are so proportioned to the butter fat that the milk is a perfectly balanced ration for the infant as well as the adult. Therefore, again, our favorites are first in producing a perfect food milk. Now, let us sum up all the facts that have been presented, and we find:

- 1st. The Holstein breed is the oldest in existence.
- 2nd. The Holstein breed, while being recognized as a strictly dairy breed, still lead all other dairy breeds in beef production.
- 3rd. That they lead all other breeds in milk production.
- 4th. That they hold the world's record for butter making.
- 5th. That they produce the best foodmilk.

Let us consult our encyclopedia and see what that says about the homeland of this noble breed, and we learn that Friesland is a Province of 1,253 square miles, and that your home county, England, annually imports from this little Province the enormous amount of almost five million pounds of cheese and thirty million pounds of butter. Think of it, farmers of Yarmouth county, that a Province only a little larger than your own county exports this tremendous quantity, while you, with great advantages as to climate and location, do not raise enough cheese and butter to supply your own people, actually importing both butter and cheese from other countries and other Provinces. But he has not got the backing of that noble animal, the Holstein cow.

However, some of the Nova Scotia farmers are waking up to the possibilities of this breed. For instance, Logan Bros., of Amherst Point, have a rich strain of Holsteins, and Mr.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres more or less.

Application for entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district in which the land is situated. Entry by proxy may however, be made at an Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

DUTIES.—(1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years. (2) A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent in the vicinity of his homestead. He may also do so by living with father or mother, on certain conditions. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement.

(3) A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself must notify the Agent for the district of such intention.

More Pledge Breaking.

Fredericton Herald:—The Solicitor General is off on a jaunt up-river instead of attending to the Crown business in the York County Court, and another lawyer partner of an M. P. supporting the government has charge of the case. Here is a chance for Mr. Pinder to reprove the government for permitting such a condition of things. Mr. Pinder has expressed the belief that all the Crown business should be attended to by the Attorney-General and Solicitor General.

Mr. Munro, Mr. Smith and Mr. Fleming also condemned the late government for hiring lawyers to do work which either of the Crown law officers could do, but it seems that the new government does not care a fig for its pre-election promises.

Clark, of Victoria, P. E. I., gives the record of one of his cows, bought of Messrs Logan. She gave him 11,449 pounds of milk, which produced 515 pounds of butter, and he figures the cost of her keep at \$40.55. What would such a cow do for any one of the farmers in Yarmouth county? Simply this: 515 pounds of butter at 22 cents per pound equals \$113.30. Add to this the skim milk at 20 cents per hundred pounds, or \$20.25, making a total of \$133.55. Deduct from this the cost of her keep, and you have yet to credit \$93, and if you call the calf worth \$7, would give \$50 for a heifer calf from such a mother, you would have a cow netting you \$100 per year. The scales and the Babcock test are the only means of judging a cow, and yet how many of you have used them? To illustrate: A gentleman was in my barn the other day looking over the stock, and the language he used about my black and white beauties isn't fit to put on paper, and point to one of them, he said he would not give one of a certain other breed for a dozen like her, and yet the scales and Babcock test showed me last year that she had produced 8,753 pounds of four per cent milk, and had netted me \$103 from her milk alone, and you could not buy her calf for \$50.

What is the use of criticizing unless you actually know by weighing and testing which are the best cows. If you will do that you will have the same results that I have had, and some of all breeds will be sent to the butcher, but fewest of all will be sent to Holstein.

Less Hell, More Heaven.

A Woman Probate Judge.

Kansas has its first women probate judge. Gov. Hoch has just settled the probate judge fight that has been going on in Mitchell County for several months by appointing Mrs. Levi Cooper, widow of probate judge, to the office. While Mr. Cooper was judge his wife acted as his duty and did most of the work in his office. There were two men candidates for the vacancy caused by the death of Judge Cooper, and both pledged themselves to appoint Mrs. Cooper his deputy. When the matter was brought to the attention of Governor Hoch he said to have remark "Since Mrs. Cooper is so valuable in office I'll make her judge."

While Mrs. Cooper is the only woman probate judge in the state, several other women hold offices of importance. Miss Oala Heinline is now serving her third term as County Attorney of Seward County, Miss Kate Johnson has just completed a term as County Treasurer of Norton County, while others are about half a dozen women serving as registrars of deed, and about thirty as county superintendents of instruction.
