George H. Foster's Record Laid Bare.

In paying attention to the editor of the Toronto Globe the other night Mr. Foster asked: "Has he been so careful when trailing through the muck and the rack at the heels of the Siftions, of the Hymans, of the Emmersons, of the Ministers of Militia?" Well, what about the Siftions, the Hymans, etc? Mr. Foster, on one occasion talked about the "Siftion cult" when Mr. Sifton was absent from parliament, but when that gentleman returned to his place and administered a rebuke to the member for North Toronto, which those who heard it will not soon forget, Mr. Foster did not have a word to say. It is to be hoped that at an early date when Mr. Sifton is present, Mr. Foster will take the opportunity to tell what this ruck and muck means. Then as to Mr. Hymman. Would it not be better to be a little more explicit. There undoubtedly were unsavory methods employed in the London bye election. But surely Mr. Hymman, although not shown to have had any personal knowledge of what was going on, has voluntarily atoned for the sins of the many by not only giving up his position in the Government but by resigning his seat in Parliament as well. As to Mr. Emmerson, it need only be said that he was an honest administrator. If Mr. Foster cares to associate himself with the keyholing and hotel backstairs gossip that were employed to injure the ex-Minister of Railways he has a right to indulge his tastes.

But the matters which in our opinion vitiate Mr. Foster's position as a public censor, his favorite pose, are not private, but, on the contrary are known and notorious. The Mail declared that Mr. Foster has vindicated himself in Parliament. Whatever Mr. Foster may have done in Parliament he did not dispose of the facts. They cover a wider range of transactions that it is convenient to go into now, but one phase of them may be represented, seeing that Mr. Foster and his chief newspaper challenge the reputation of them.

Mr. Foster was the manager of a Trust Company, almost the whole of whose capital of some \$2,000,000 was supplied from the surpluses of the Foresters. It will be remembered that Messrs. Fowler, Lefurgey, Bennett and Company had become possessed of a large block of Canadian Pacific Railway lands, bought on favorable terms, along what Mr. Dan Mann gave them the tip would be

the route of the Canadian Northern Railway. Mr. Foster and his two friends Messrs. McGillivray and Mathew Wilson, bought 200,000 acres from Fowler and company at an advance of a dollar an acre. The three gentlemen named turned these lands over to a corporation formed on the spot known as the Great West Land Company, at another advance of fifty cents an acre. The sum total of this advance was the capital stock of the new concern.

Mr. Foster was a third part of the syndicate which bought from Fowler and company and he was a third part of the Great West Land Company that bought from himself. But he had still to reveal himself in his last and greatest character, namely, as the Manager of the Trust Company controlling two millions of the trust funds of the Foresters. For the lands which as a syndicator he had bought for \$4.50 an acre and as such turned over to himself as a member of the Great West Land Company at \$5., and finally as Manager of the Trust Company he advanced practically the only money that had as yet appeared in the whole series of transactions. Why as Manager of the Trust Company he did not let his Company have the first advantage when the lands were being disposed of at \$4.50 he does not explain.

But there was a sequential transaction of a most extraordinary kind in consideration of the advance of a quarter of a million dollars on the land, 337 shares of the Great West Land Company's stock was made over to the Trust Company as a bonus for its good offices. Subsequently, Mr. E. G. Stevenson the present head of the Order, not wholly satisfied with the land transaction made fresh arrangements for greater security for the money of the order. While this was being arranged the 337 shares, which had been made over to the Trust Company, were by resolution handed back to Messrs. Foster, McGillivray and Wilson. Why the company should have been deprived of them or why these three gentlemen should secure them is quite dark. None of the other directors remember of any such resolution passing the board.

Now if Mr. Foster knows that Messrs. Sifton, Hymman, or Emmerson has been guilty of a series of similarly tortuous transactions he should make the country aware of them. When he mentions their names in connection with his own, people are apt to conclude that he desires to defend himself by besmirching them.
