Hartland.

The weather for the past few weeks has furnished a variety of changes, heavy snow storm, strong winds, some rain with occasional hot sun melting the snow and making muddy roads. A portion of the time neither wheels or runners could carry a load, farmers have to haul, with potatoes and products to market.

The general trade has been very quiet due principally to causes above mentioned. The village trade holds its average.

Quite a number have sent their last order to the departmental stores at a distance from here, are satisfied that baits are thrown by under prices to be paid for later on when the larger orders are sent. There is certain cost in the manufacture of all kinds of goods and when they are sold under said figures there is something wrong, either a bankrupt stock, some dishonest dealer squandering a stock to avoid paying for it and pocketing the money. Any experienced buyer can purchase goods just as cheap as another. Goods a long time on hand or having been damaged by fire and water cleaned up and sold it may be under the hammer and will sometime be slaughtered, but to buy perfect new and saleable stock at less than first cost is absurd.

The merchants of Hartland take especial pains in catering to the wants of their customers and sometimes at a loss. They also have been in the habit of carrying many of their customers over hard places even for a year or more and it does not show a right principle that when such get a little money, that they ship it away for low price goods in many instances shoddy and at no time any real bargain.

Some talk of a strictly cash business. They may not sell as much, but can sell cheaper and it will be more satisfactory, no more books, dunning letters, protests and false promises.

Some parties will build this season on the burned district, but not all, what will be built will be mostly of brick preparations. Keith & Plummer will be the largest. A fine store.

Some late changes, T J Hurley having purchased the John Dickinson property on Main Street from Dr MacIntosh having therein a dwelling house and store. Mr Hurley has moved into the house and the store occupied for nearly four years past by J C Everett. He is stocking with goods. Mr Everett has gone to the H N Boyer building next south of Clark's Hotel on Main street south, adjacent to consecrated ground.

The street flat of McAdam's Blacksmith shop will be converted into a store to be occupied by H R Nixon who now has the upper flat.

J C Everett in his new location has improved desk accommodation and has received a good stock of fresh canned goods, teas, soda and sweet biscuit, a good line of whips, confectionery and many notions. The collection of accounts especially in which he has been successful with little suing, sells marriage licenses, rubber heels and shoe findings.

At present tenement buildings are scarce.

Our enterprising citizen J D Shaw has established a bakery on his home premises, has a new oven from a factory in Burlington, Vt, latest improved, it will now be unnecessary to send away for baker's bread, patronize home industries.

VICTORIA POLITICIANS ARE AT LOGGERHEADS

Senator Baird and Charles Curless Disagree About Liquor License Matters.

An interesting story reaches the Star from Victoria County. It is to the effect that Charles Curless, of Grand Falls, who was one of the Hazen candidates in the recent election will soon discover whether he has the influence he supposed he had in the councils of the new Provincial Government. Mr Curless made a strong recommendation with respect to the office of Liquor License Inspector of the county and it is understood that his recommendation was backed by Mr Manzer, who was his colleague in the campaign. It has already been announced that the Government has appointed Hon Mr Flemming a commissioner to investigate all matters in connection with the Liquor License Inspection in Victoria County. It now comes to light that the real reason for the appointment of the commissioner is that Senator Baird has made a recommendation to the Government, which is directly opposite to that made by Mr Curless. The latter is known to have written to the government or to the Premier a strong protest against paying any attention to the recommendation of Senator Baird. Those who are familiar with the contents of the letter say that it would make very interesting reading. In any case it looks as though the Hazen Government would lose the support of either Senator Baird or Mr Curless and perhaps the latter's colleague, Mr Manzer, unless indeed Commissioner Flemming should prove himself an expert in the diplomatic line and succeed in smoothing over the matter.—St John Star.

Mr Curless and the liquor party have no use for Inspector Mc Crea. They are anxious to have him ousted. Senator Baird is standing behind the Inspector in the interest of temperance. The situation is rather interesting, but is merely one of the many difficulties a party in power is bound to face.

Forest Fire Protection; The Need.

Fire is the greatest enemy the forest has; and, before it is worth while attempting any scientific management of the forest, some means must be put in operation for keeping the fires out of it, so that there may be some certainty of our having a forest to manage. The amount of damage done to the forest by fires in times before any protective system was established is simply incalculable; it has often been said, and probably even falls short of the truth, that for every dollar's worth of timber taken by the lumbermen from the valley of the Ottawa river, one of Canada's greatest lumbering districts, fires have destroyed ten dollars' worth.

Most in evidence is the destruction done by "crown" fires, fires which get up into the foliage of the trees. In many tracts of the wooded districts of Canada mile after mile of country has been swept over by such a fire, and of what was once a thrifty, green forest only blackened stumps and tree trunks remain. Sometimes the consequences are even more serious, and much life and property is destroyed. The Miramichi, N. B., fire of October, 1825, destroyed 160 lives and a quarter of a million pounds sterling, in property; and two such fires in Wisconsin—the Peshtigo fire of 1871 and the Hinckley fire of 1894—were responsible for the loss of 1,600 lives and many millions of dollars' worth of property.

A vast amount of loss is also done by "ground" and "surface" fires, fires which burn in the soil of the forest or run along the surface and lick up the dead leaves and other debris of the forest. While not much timber is consumed by the fire itself, the fire damages the bases and roots of the trees, and through the wounds thus made fungi gain entrance to the tree and cause the rotting of the wood. In parts of the largest Dominion forest reserve (the Riding Mountain reserve, in Manitoba), especially among the aspen or white popular, three out of every four trees are found to be damaged in this way. The area has been repeatedly burned over; the trees were thus wounded, the fungus spores gained entrance and the above result followed.

Insects may also gain access to the tree trunks in this way.

In view of these facts the importance of fire protection in the forest can easily be realized. The great thing to be done is to discover and put out the fire before it gets a start, and this is the great aim of the fire patrol systems instituted by the Dominion and several of the Provincial Governments. 4—08—4A.


