In his address Saturday night Mr Frank Carvell took occasion to say that the opposition organ and orators who condemn him now for participating in his campaign did not aid him in his fight to secure a seat at Ottawa, and are not the parties who will help him should he ever again become a candidate, and moreover the friends who voted to send him to Ottawa enthusiastically welcome his services in this campaign. This seems to us a pretty fair way to put it. We can sympathize with the Opposition. Their loud squealing at F B Carvell's participation is eloquent testimony to the fact that they mightily fear his efforts, and well-known that with him in the fight they cannot hope for success. The Liberal party is not complaining over a surplus of Carvells.

Very many in Woodstock and vicinity will deeply regret to learn of the death of Miss M Ivy Hale, which took place Tuesday afternoon at the home of her uncle, Fred H Hale, Enderby, B. C. Deceased, who went West only a couple of years ago, was in her 35th year, the eldest daughter of the late George Hale of Grafton, of whose family she was the surviving member. She had been seriously ill since June, suffering from a general breakdown. In this town and county Miss Hale had a very large circle of friends and acquaintances who will sincerely mourn her death. She was a graduate of the Newport (R I) Training School for nurses and a young woman of noble, christian character. The remains were interred at Enderby.

All Counties Ready.

Every constituency in the province is now provided with its government standardbearers. Little Sunbury on Saturday placed its men in the field, —Dr Peake who five years ago gave Mr Hazen such a close run, and Mr W M Thurrott, the well-known farmer and travelling representative of the Provincial Chemical Fertilizer Company. This excellent ticket is putting up a strenuous battle. It is confidently predicted that Thurrott will lead the poll, while Mr Hazen will be extremely fortunate should he nose-out the popular doctor.

Taking the province as a whole, it is hard to see where Mr Hazen can hope to make material gains. Restigouche is traditionally in support of this government. Gloucester offers no hope to Mr Hazen, —indeed his ticket in that county is merely one of straw, the only danger to the administration being from overstrength, thereby arising a possibility of division. In Northumberland there are already two Opposition members, and no sane man predicts any more. Kent County is in line with the government, a very strong ticket being opposed by an aggregation made up of a military man of small calibre and a couple of windy and shallow physicians. Westmoreland, it is not worth while considering from a Conservative standpoint. In Albert Speaker Osman and his colleague have increased their strength. St John City and County with their six seats will scarcely fail to send a solid six to support the government. Charlotte is the scene of a battle royal, where the advantage is apparently with the government. Kings is morally certain to elect three Liberals and Queens will send two more. Sunbury we have already spoken of. York will have no use for the laughing stock quartet, and Carleton is sure to go Liberal. No doubt of it whatever. Victoria and Madawaska are likewise solid for Premier Robinson. Mr Hazen will be fortunate to get back himself, and if he shall succeed in so doing, cannot hope to have at most a dozen supporters.

Nomination proceedings will be held on Tuesday, 25th inst, at the Court House. Every Liberal in the County should make an effort to get there.

Ossie at it Again.

An Ottawa dispatch to the St John Telegraph on Monday conveyed the somewhat amusing intimation that Mr Crocket of York county had been propounding a few questions. This gentleman has probably more interrogatories to his credit than any three members of the present parliament. Usually his puzzlers have to do with very large matters, but in the present instance he has digressed a bit, the subject of his curiosity being Charles L Smith, Postmaster at Woodstock. The object of his queries seems to be an attempt to fasten upon Mr Smith the charge of being a participant in the present political contest. Mr Crocket is reported as asking Hon Mr Lemieux if it had come to the knowledge of the department that Mr Smith has been taking an active part in the campaign, and in particular that he had been a speaker at a Liberal meeting on the night of Feb 1st. To these questions the Postmaster General replied in the negative. Everyone here fully understands that Mr Smith has by no means been active in the fight. It is true that on invitation after dropping into the Liberal Committee rooms on the evening named he did in a jocular vein make a few remarks of a non-partisan and non-political nature, but he has not even been a regular attendant, is on no committees, and is apparently minding his own business,—something which Mr Crocket apparently has failed to do. Of course in this case the windy York County member is merely the tool of some local sorehead who takes this means of getting a whack at the Postmaster from under cover, over the shoulders of the bumptious interrogator. Mr Crocket should have more sense than to be made a fool of by those who have stuffed him. Of course he is already a laughing stock in the Commons, so really it makes but little difference what he may do or say, more especially since he is destined to early and certain defeat at the hands of Mr Whitehead.

Andover

On Friday last as the extra freight from Edmundston was near Limestone crossing, the engineer, H Camp observed a man sitting on the track only a few cars length ahead. He gave the usual alarm but the man made no move to get clear of the approaching train, and was struck and killed. The body was brought to Aroostook by conductor George McCluskey, where it was identified to be one Wm Sullivan of Costigan a few miles above Aroostook Jct. The deceased was a young man of about 23 years old and a son of Thomas Sullivan of that place. He was on his way home from the lumber woods and is supposed to have been drinking. Coroner Welling of Andover was summoned but did not consider it necessary to hold an inquest after full inquiry was made.

A fire broke out last evening in the office room of G M McRae's barn and after hard fighting from the Perth and Andover fire departments it was put out only barely saving a big loss to Mr McRae and C W Lewis's store which was very close. Great work was done by the many willing workers of both villages. The loss will not be over \$300.00.

The election campaign is progressing by both parties. Mr Curless is very active in this section of the county as well as Manzer. Their chances for being elected are considered very doubtful, while the old members Mr Burgess and Tweedale are conceded to be sure of election. A full government ticket will be returned from Victoria on the 3rd of March.

H H Hopkins of Aroostook Jct has gone to Fredericton to complete his course in Military School.

A case of smallpox is reported at the Minto Hotel, Grand Falls. Dr Welling the chairman of board of health was called to look into the case yesterday.

It is reported the leader of the opposition, Mr Hazen will be at Andover on Monday next. Perhaps he will tell us more about the school books, which the government so cleverly exposed by the Attorney General when here last week.

The citizens of Andover and Perth are gathering in the usual supply of ice for summer. X. Y. Z.
