Dunn's Camp.

Seeing no items from this part of the country I will try and tell you how we are getting along up here. Well now we are camping on the Mamaziekel twelve miles from the settlement. Our camp is built in a place called Smoky Hollow and the cook room is twenty-four by eighteen the sleeping room is twenty-six foot square and the sitting room eight by ten. We have five pair of horses yarding here. Peter Gallagher holds the ribbons over the leading team and he can pile as many logs as any man I ever saw. he has yarded three hundred and nine pieces in one day. His crew are Wallace R Ryan who is his team tender and Wallace is a hustler after the logs and most generally has the last one at night. John Ring and John Avery are transferring brush and John Mushrow and Percy Chute are the boys who can fall as many as any other two men that ever came up Tobique, while John Montague is clerking for his team. Our Boss, Thomas Dunn is as jolly a fellow as one would wish to see and knows how to place his men and where to get the logs. Joseph McCarten is our cook and as good as ever come up the river. He can cook anything that a man would want from a pancake to an orange stew. There are fifty seven men in this camp and they are as good as a crew of men as you can find anywhere I am sure. Howard Nelson from Woodstock gives us a little scripture now and then. He is well posted or thinks he is, but then will do to work in the woods. We have not much snow here yet, and it is good yarding. Two of our boys got cut very bad last week and had to be taken out. Richard Hanson was treed by a very large bear the other day and got a bad scare but is all right again. While Bennie Hanson is our kicker and now he does alright at it and he has license to tell a good yarn whenever it suits him. John Ring gives the boys a song now and then and he is assisted by George Palmer. Tommie White and Hosie Burton are our dancers while Jeddie Brown is our musician.
