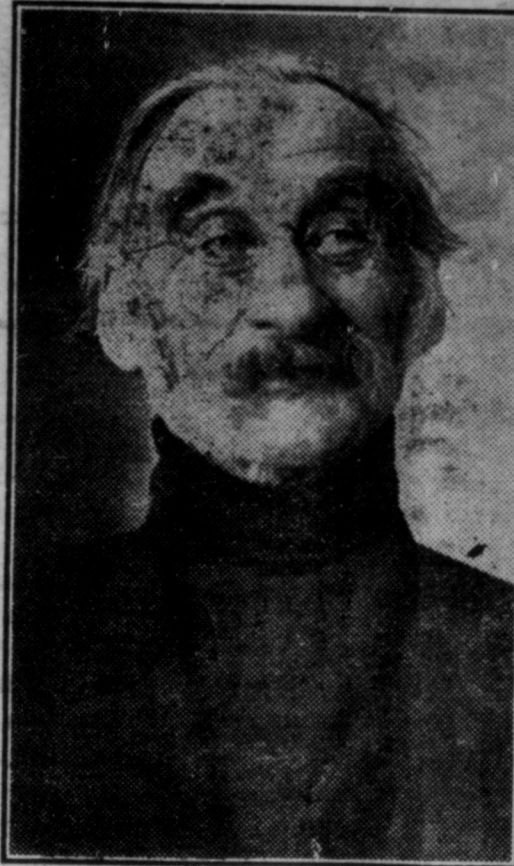

SOME THOUGHTS.

The C. P. R. passes through two counties, Carleton and Victoria, in passing from Woodstock northward. It follows the Bank of the St. John river, from Woodstock to Edmundston, 130 miles, which is very convenient for the front tiers. The Gibson branch is very convenient for that section, including the lumbermen. Everybody cannot expect to have a church and a railway at their own doors. The parish of Richmond is well favored in different ways; one of the privileges they enjoy is the C. P. R. passes through fifteen miles of it. The iron horse can do the work easier than flesh and blood horses that eat hay and oats. The large and well loaded trains that come to Woodstock from Edmundston and intermediate points every two hours in the 21 is a good evidence of the prosperous country. There are a certain number that have to draw their product from 8 to 18 miles, but please take notice that 50 years ago the product was drawn by teams to Bangor, St. John, Fredericton, Calais and St. Stephen, a ten or twelve days' trip. Great changes have since been made. The C. P. R. can take people to the outside world in a few hours. To the C. P. R. Co., I return humble thanks for advertising favors in the past from Presque Isle to St. John, Fredericton, Forest City and return to Woodstock. I enjoyed seeing many improvements, including the machine shop at McAdam.

I noticed in the Sentinel of the 20th, over my sketches, a heading "Sermon by Calvin Green." Possibly the editor for a few years back has been very much engaged in preaching politics. It is very easy to preach a sermon on the Bible or politics either when a person enjoys a large and well supplied talents, as the editor of the Sentinel is favored with, but still the result might be like sounding brass or tinkling cymbal. There is a possibility of a certain percentage of professional men having more conceit than they can carry smooth through the walks of life, not saying the editor of the Sentinel is of that type for he is a jolly good fellow every day in the week, Sundays included, 52 weeks in the year. The editor of the Sentinel is the first man I worked for in the newspaper line. He asked me to work for the interest of the Sentinel, the good and whole hearted editor gave me a present worth \$8.00; after I got the coat I skipped out of his employ. He has assisted me in many different ways and I remember his good deeds, but I have been expecting a high beaver hat from him for the last two years; if it does not come in 1908 I will give up hope. When the editor gets the writer well posted in preaching sermons and politics he will give up newspaper work. Peter said things or made statements that looked like lies; we are all liable to do the same, especially when my sketches are headed as a sermon.

The year 1907 has been a very peculiar year. Early in the year a heavy snow blockade; next three months of cold and heavy rain storms. During October Jack Frost held the potatoes in his grasp; his next visit was on the second week in December when he placed a temporary bridge across the St. John river but in a few days the south wind, accompanied with showers, made the ice move, the water freshet high. The last week of the year 1907 Jack Frost placed a second bridge across the river, but the present time shows evidence of an open winter. The result will be a harvest for blacksmiths and wagon makers. The roads are very rough. No government to blame at this time of year. The ears of the government have been kept warm the last few years over the bad roads.—C. G.
