## Balm for Mayor.

Nobody seems to want the Mayorship, at least no person has evinced a desire to run for the position. A requisition is out for Mr George E Balm, who however is like all the rest, he would rather be excused, but probably will not see the place go vacant. Mr Balm is a gentleman who some time ago sat a year at the Council, and is by nature and education pretty well qualified for the position. Of course he is a conservative, but the SENTINEL unlike one or two of our opponents, is not so hidebound as to start on the war path looking for a candidate to wipe out any opponent who may even be suspected of wanting a job, from hog reeve up. Mr Balm is a leading member of the School Board, which each year spends some \$8000 of the town taxes, so perhaps it will be all for the better on that account should he become Mayor.

## Big Effort to Save Tom David.

The Assyrian colony in Lowell, Mass., the city from which Tom David hails, will make a big effort to save Tom from the gallows. It will be remembered that one fine morning last July Tom pumped some lead into Mrs David in the waiting room at McAdam, from the effects of which broadside the lady died. The murderer is now in jail at Fredericton, and will be placed on trial next week. The Solicitor General is to prosecute, and Hon J D Hazen has been retained by the Assyrians to defend the criminal.

The Assyrian colony in Lowell have raised a big sum, said to be four or five thousand dollars, and will bring on about a dozen witnesses, one of whom is an American physician, who is expected to give evidence to the effect that Tom is a lunatic. Tom's father is reported crazy, and it is further alleged that even Julia David's father and mother will come down to help out in the defence. The shooting will be admitted, and the plea of insanity, somewhat along the line of Thaw's disease, will be pleaded. The trial will almost certainly be one of the hardest fought legal battles the province has yet seen, for the defence is well fortified with the shrews of war.

A very pretty wedding was celebrated at the residence of Mr and Mrs C W Dickinson of Debec Jan 1st 3 P M in the presence of 75 guests when their eldest daughter Ethel E was united in marriage to Mr LeRoy A M King. The ceremony was performed by the groom's father the Rev A K King of Boiestown assisted by the Rev H E Harrison Pastor of the Methodist Church Debec. The house was prettily decorated for the occasion. The bride was handsomely attired in blue satin with cream all over lace robe and bridal veil fastened with white carnations and

ferns and carried a bouquet of the same. The wedding march was played by Miss Edna Hoyt while the Bridal party entered the room the bride leaning on her father's arm, she was attended by two flower girls little Miss Pauline Dickinson and Inez Sanderson. The double ring service was used. A sumptuous Lunch was served immediately after the ceremony.

The bride was a very popular young lady and will be greatly missed by her many friends at Debec. She was an earnest worker both in Church and Sabbath School.

Mr and Mrs King left on the 6 o'clock train amid a shower of rice, for an extended tour to Montreal, Toronto and Niagara Falls returning home by the way of Fredericton and Boiestown.

A pretty wedding took place at the home of Mr and Mrs Fraser Richardson, Lower Brighton, on Tuesday Dec 24th when their daughter, Minetta, was united in marriage to Marshall Chase of Clarkville.

The ceremony was performed by Rev A F Baker of Hartland in the presence of a large number of guests. The bride was very tastefully attired in a cream dress with lace trimmings. After the ceremony a very bountiful dinner was served and the bride and groom left by the afternoon express for a three weeks trip to Manchester and Lowell.

## SECRET BALLOT.

The New Brunswick Elections Act as Amended Providing for a Secret Ballot.

Since the last General Election in this Province, the Legislature has amended the Elections Act so as to provide for a Secret Ballot and to have a sufficient number of Polling Booths in each sub-division, so that all voters may have ample time to poll their ballots. The provisions of the amendments as adopted at the sessions of 1904 and 1907 are as follows,—

(a) Whenever the number of voters on the list in any one polling sub-division exceeds three hundred, the returning officer shall provide two or more polling stations for such sub-division, and ballot boxes for each, dividing the list alphabetically, so as to allow as nearly as possible, an equal number of voters not to exceed three hundred, to deposit their ballots in each box. Not more than one ballot box shall be allowed in each polling station and each station shall have an entrance separate from all other polling stations. All necessary check lists, returns, clerks &c shall be provided for each station.

(b) The polling stations shall not be open to the public and a constable duly sworn shall be in charge of the door.

(c) Only one elector at a time shall be admitted to vote.

(d) The elector so admitted and found entitled to vote, shall receive from the deputy returning officer an unopened envelope, take it into a compartment completely screened from the rest of the room and there place his ballot in the envelope, which latter he shall hand back to the deputy returning officer, who shall put it in the ballot box in the said elector's presence. Unless such elector shall have gone into said secret compartment and there placed his ballot in the envelope the deputy returning officer shall not receive the envelope from said elector.

(e) The deputy returning officer must provide a table in the secret compartment where ballots for the different candidates may be placed.

(f) A ballot must be made on white paper by printing or writing in black letters only, the names or surnames of the candidate or candidates, with black ink or black lead pencil. They may be partly written and partly printed and some names may be marked through or struck out and others added if desired.

(g) A voter who cannot read or cannot see, or who for any cause is unable to vote as the law directs, may take oath to that effect and the deputy returning officer in the presence of each candidate shall place in the envelope a ballot bearing the name or names for whom said elector declares his intention of voting.

## ILLEGAL ACTS AND PENALTIES UNDER THE ELECTIONS ACT.

Anyone who takes an official envelope from the polling booth shall incur a penalty of \$200. (Sec. 8 Chap. 3, 4 Edward VII.)

Anyone personating any elector, voting when not qualified, or voting more than once shall incur a penalty of \$40. (Sec. 84. Consol Statutes 1903.)

Anyone who pay out money or makes threats to influence an elector to vote shall incur a penalty of \$80 and be forever debarred from voting at any election (Sec. 90 Cap 3 Consol Statutes 1903.)

At the official opening of the King Edward Sanatorium for Consumptives, near Toronto, His Excellency delivered an address that must have an important bearing on the future of the sanatorium movement in Canada. We quote:—

"The proceedings this afternoon commenced with a beautiful and reverent prayer from your old friend, Dr. Potts. He prayed that the light of the Lord might shine upon us. That prayer is abundantly answered. He also prayed that the White Plague might be removed. Well, whether that prayer will be answered or not depends upon yourselves."

"Is it not a standing shame and reproach to the governments and individuals that there is not more care taken by the people of Canada to protect themselves against the curse of consumption?"

On his way out to the King Edward Sanatorium,—so named by permission of His Majesty King Edward VII.—the Governor-General's car was stopped in its progress outside the Canada Cycle & Motor Co. by a large crowd of its employees.
