The ceremony was performed by the Rector, the Rev. H. Goring Alder, in the presence of a great many invited guests, as well as hundreds of interested spectators. The beautiful floral decorations, with the many splendid costumes gave the assembly the appearance of a special grandeur.

Sharp at three o'clock, preceded by the full choir and the rector, the bride entered the church, on the arm of her father, and proceeded to the altar, where the groom was awaiting her. She was dressed in a magnificent imported creation of lace over chiffon and silk, and wore the conventional orange blossoms and veil. She also bore a magnificent bouquet.
