HOW THEY ELECT A PRESIDENT

The Electoral College is an Antiquated Institution That Has Outlived its Influence.

The process of electing the President by an Electoral College is one that is perfectly amazing that the practical Americans have not got rid of long ago. For generations, the College has not even pretended to do the work for which it was intended. The theory was—as everyone knows—that the States would send their wisest citizens, irrespective of party, to an Electoral College; and that these citizens, entirely unpledged beforehand, would there deliberate and pick out the one American best qualified to sit in the Presidential chair. Of course, nothing of the sort happens. The members of the Electoral College are merely counters in the game. Few people know who they are. They represent only so many Republican or Democratic votes from their respective States in favor of a definite set of candidates placed in nomination before they are chosen. Every man of them is bound in the most sacred way; and the nation would be outraged if they were to fail to elect the candidate to whom a majority of them were pledged.

But, while the collapse of the original plan is only grotesque, the result is most unsatisfactory. New York for example, has thirty-nine votes in the Electoral College; and this tremendous block in a body con-

sisting of only 483 members may be cast this way or that by thirty-nine or even nine votes polled by individual electors. On the other hand there are thirteen States which only total thirty-nine votes in the College between them; and these votes may be divided against themselves, so as to affect nothing if the States possessing them go to different parties. Again, a very small majority may cast New York's thirty-nine for the Republicans, while a very large popular majority may cast the other thirty-nine for the Democrats. The result might be, of course, that the minority candidate would be seated—a result which was actually achieved in 1876.

Elections by constituencies, such as we have in this country, is open to the same objection; but to a very much lesser degree. Each constituency casts but one vote in our Parliament, while New York casts 39, Pennsylvania 34, and Illinois 27.

Thus the opportunities to kill a popular majority are multiplied in the American case many fold. Then, again, a President is an officer who all could so easily be elected by popular majority. Governors are elected that way; and they hold very analogous positions. The objection will be made that one State would not be willing to have its honest vote drawn out by what it would regard as a dishonest majority from another State; but this could be off-set by splitting the States up into constituencies—say, the Congressional districts—and allowing them to choose only as many "Electors" as these would furnish. This would have the advantage of dividing New York's thirty-nine up, and taking away from a small majority in that State so commanding a position the contest.

CHRIST OF THE ANDES.

The progress of thought made among men since the time, little more than half a century ago, when our pious and well-meaning fathers frowned upon all drama and theatre going as an innovation from the lower regions, was never better illustrated than by the fact that Mrs Minnie Madden Fiske, the actress, is in consultation with President Angell of the American Humane Education Society, with regard developing a drama founded on the noble figure of the Christ, made of molten cannon, which stands on the crest of the Andes mountains, overlooking Chli and the Argentine republic, known as "The Christ of the Andes," and symbolizing the guaranty of eternal peace between the two countries.

Standing twenty-six feet high, at an altitude of 14,450 feet above the sea level, is this famous statue, cast from cannon taken from an ancient Spanish fortress when Argentina declared her independence of the since decadent, but erstwhile powerful, nation which once held Cuba in her thrall. In the left hand of the colossal figure is the cross, lifted five feet above the head, and the right hand is extending in blessing. On the base is inscribed: "Sooner shall these mountains crumble into dust than shall the people of Argentina and of

Chili break the peace which they have pledged themselves at the feet of Christ the Redeemer."

It would be interesting to know the detail of the erection of this noble monument; but it is there, perhaps the grandest ornament of the doctrines of the "Prince of Peace" ever raised by human hands. Its very existence is known only to the comparatively few people who read much; but we venture to say that if the mooted plan of the actress and Mr Angell come to fruition, the drama which shall commemorate it will be one of the most forceful in its application, as is the statue in conception, of all the world's agencies in enforcing its aspirations for "peace on earth" and "good will to men."—Newburyport, Mass. News, Sept 28 1908.
