THE STANDARD OF THE WORLD

A Bumper Crop.

All reports from the West indicate a bumper harvest. The work of cutting, threshing and garnering this immense crop will give months of employment to a vast army of laborers, and it is estimated that between twenty five and thirty thousand helpers will be required for this year's harvesting. The farmers of the east are as much interested in this matter as are their western brethren, in fact, it is a work of national importance, and the call from the West for help must be heard and heeded in these eastern provinces, for upon the West depends largely the growth and development of the country. The Canadian Pacific Railway, realizing the demand for labor in the West, will, as in previous years, run farm laborers' excursions and it is expected the laborers from the Maritime Provinces will be required to leave here about the first or second week in August. The exact date will be announced later. The general arrangements for the excursion will be along the lines of excursions run in previous years.
